



THE CRISIS PREGNANCY HOT LINE REPORT.

KVDP, through it's public affairs broadcast, has helped identify a community need for a Crisis Pregnancy Counseling Center Hot Line. This report helps to coordinate the work of several Pro-Life Groups in Central Louisiana. The report was initiated by the station in August, 1988. It is generally done by Dinah Rankin, either in the studio by telephone hook-up or sometimes on location by tape. It is open to those in the right-to-life movement and is designed to benefit women dealing with unplanned pregnancies. It provides information on the availability of prenatal care, parenting, adoption and other alternatives to abortion. No charges or fees are involved. The report is 30 to 45 minutes long and is aired on Tuesday of each week.

THE LOUISIANA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME HOUR.

A one hour weekly program of music, items of news and information on the activities of the Home. Louisiana Baptist Children's Home is located in Monroe, Louisiana, and is operated by the Louisiana Southern Baptist Convention. The program is hosted by Mr. Earl Mercer, Public Affairs Director for the Home. The purpose of the program is to familiarize the the community with the work of the Home and to offer those who wish an opportunity to participate in it's activities. The program was initiated in September, 1988, and airs from 5:00 PM to 6:00 PM Sunday and anyone connected with the Louisiana Baptist Children's Home is free to take part. No fees or charges are involved.

LOUISIANA BLOOD CENTER.

Blood drives were conducted by the Louisiana Blood Center with promotion and scheduling by KVDP Radio. Any Agency providing community support may participate in KVDP's programming. The blood drives helped to meet a critical need for blood donors at that time. KVDP has continued to work closely with the Louisiana Blood Center in other areas of Central Louisiana. Time is provided to people for each Blood Drive conducted within our listening area. No fees or charges are involved.

THE GRANT PARISH HOME ECONOMIST.

Jane Jones, Home Economist with the Grant Parish Agriculture Extension Service, conducts the program. It is a chit chatty program that deals with subjects from gardening to home canning to clothing care, quilting, and child raising. It was initiated by the station in June, 1988.

The program is produced by the Grant Parish Agriculture Extension Service from their office in Colfax. Time and space is always available to public or private agencies to serve the public interest.

There are no fees or charges involved. This program is needed to alert the community of some of the services available from the Grant Parish Agriculture Extension Service. It is aired 5 minutes daily, Monday through Friday.

MEDICAL REPORTS

We have monthly and quarterly reports from Physicians from the Central Louisiana Area, Dr. Jonathan Forester and Dr. Robert Rush. Dr. Rush and Dr. Forester discuss (on separate occasions) topics such as weight management, stress, emotional problems relating to jobs, their relationship to sickness and disease, along with many more topics. We have these two physicians here at KVDP as often as they can get away from their medical practices.

FRIENDLY WORLD MINISTRIES

Mrs. Bea Farmearl, a local black pastor in Central Louisiana comes to KVDP each Wednesday Evening at 7:PM and shares music and ministry to the black community. Mrs. Farmearl works with youth mostly in the community and works along with KVDP for a Summer Youth Program, discussed in more detail.

SOLDIERS OF SALVATION SHELTER FOR THE HOMELESS.

In September, 1989, KVDP was asked to assist in the opening of a shelter for the homeless in Pineville. KVDP provided air time for the mission staff to share with the community the plight of the homeless in Central Louisiana, and some of the ways they could be a part in meeting some of these needs. The management of the mission has relied heavily on KVDP to get their message out. As a result, several individuals and churches have come forward to assist in this shelter for the homeless. There are no charges or fees involved.

ELECTION COVERAGE.

KVDP provides complete election returns for Grant Parish. Grant Parish Clerk of Court has allowed KVDP to set up a remote broadcast from his office to provide election returns immediately as they are received by the Clerk's Office. This is most helpful due to the fact that the local news paper is published weekly. There are no charges or fees for this service. The telephone line is provided by the Grant Parish Court House. Every election held in Louisiana is covered.

GRANT PARISH SCHOOL BOARD.

KVDP provides a platform for the Board to communicate with the Community. Budget cuts along with a mandage by a Federal judge to build a new elementary school in Prospect, the Superintendent and the Board were hard pressed to get to the people. KVDP provided Public Affairs air time for the presentation of this need.

A new school is now under construction on Egg Farm Road in the Prospect Community. There were no charges or fees involved.

GRANT HIGH SCHOOL SPORTS.

Beginning in the Fall of 1987, KVDP, in cooperation with the Athletic Department of Grant High School, began to broadcast the Grant Cougar Football and Basketball programs. Community interest and support for the athletic program at Grant high has increased noticeably. There are no charges or fees involved in the broadcasts, which are usually about three hours in length, and are scheduled once or twice a week during the season.

THE LEGISLATURE REPORT.

Each morning during the Legislative Session, KVDP broadcasts a live report by the Representative of the 22nd District on the activities at the Legislature. The report comes in the form of a phone conversation between the Representative and the announcer at the station. Questions from the audience are forwarded to the Representative for his answer or comment on the next report. This communication with the Representative has served the community well, and generated considerable traffic in the 1990 Session as they dealt with the Pro-Life Legislation before the House. Special sessions called by the Governor are also covered by this report. Periodic reports are broadcast throughout the year as issues on both the State and National levels create interest or questions. There are no charges or fees involved. Each broadcast involves from 15 to 30 minutes, Monday through Friday, while the session is on. This report comes in about 7:30 AM, and is taped for rebroadcast in the evening following the 6:00 PM news.

SOMETHING SPECIAL.

A one hour program devoted to local events of public interest. The program was initiated in November, 1988, by the station. It is conducted as an open forum, generally in the KVDP station, and occasionally by tape on location or by live telephone hook-up. This forum is open to the public to discuss matters of community interest. There are no charges or fees. Please see attachments for examples of this program. This program is one hour long Monday through Friday.

SHERIFF'S DRUG PROGRAM.

A program is being developed in conjunction with the Grant Parish Sheriff's Office. Sheriff L. R. Hataway has discussed with us the need to provide the community with information and gather their support for the D.A.R.E. Program of drug prevention in the local schools.

Time will be provided by KVDP to broadcast this information. The broadcasts will, to begin with, involve the showcasing of the D.A.R.E. Program to reach parents with the problem, and to provide information directed to students and young adults during music segments.

The program will also include interviews, forums, and spot announcements designed to reach those who need help.

We are convinced that working with law enforcement and the D.A.R.E. Program we can see some positive results with slowing down the drug problem in Central Louisiana.

There will be no charges or fees. This program is still in the formative stages and should be ready to implement in February or March, 1991.

A PROPOSED PROGRAM.

Since the 1987 elections, we at KVDP Radio have proposed to do a special program on the philosophy of the two major political parties. What makes a Democrat? What makes a Republican? Where did you get your political convictions? Are they genetic or what? We have had opportunity to also present this forum to the Grant High School Civics Class.

The problem has been, we cannot get qualified representatives for either party to take part. Each wants to come on individually and "beat the drum" for their own cause. We will, however, continue to make the offer. (I just thought whoever reads this report might find this of interest).

PROPOSED PROJECTS

There are four (4) major medical facilities in Central Louisiana, a large state operated mental hospital, and several nursing home facilities.

Angola State Prison has a facility at Camp Beauregard. There is a Federal Prison recently opened in Winn Parish, and a new prison coming to Grant Parish in the very near future.

We would like to make available to these facilities, at no cost to them, fixed tuned radios to receive KVDP. We have conducted this program in KIFM Radio in Bakersfield, California, several years ago and it really works.

Our problem here is that we need to increase our power substantially because at this point we cannot reach inside the buildings.

We also would like to consider carrying the Sonshine Network which is carried on our sub-carrier. There is nothing of this kind being done in this area. This is programming for children.

A frequent comment we get from our public is "We really enjoy your station, the music and programs, and we can listen in our car, but we can't pick it up in the house".

DECLARATION OF TRUST

DECLARATION OF TRUST, made as of the 19th day of February, 1983

who hereby declare and agree that they received this day from Maxwell E. Latham, Jr., as donor, the sum of Ten Dollars, and that they will hold and manage the same and any additions to it IN TRUST, as follows:

FIRST: This trust shall be called Dry Prong Educational Broadcasting Foundation.

SECOND: The trustees may receive and accept property, whether real, personal, or mixed, by way of gift, bequest, or device, from any person, firm, trust, or corporation, to be held, administered, and disposed of in accordance with and pursuant to the provisions of this Declaration of Trust; but no gift, bequest, or device of any such property shall be received and accepted if it be conditioned or limited in such manner as shall require the disposition of the income or its principal to any person or organization other than a "charitable organization," or for other than "charitable purposes" within the meaning of such terms as defined in Article Three of this Declaration of Trust, or as shall in the opinion of the trustees, jeopardize the Federal income tax exemption of this trust pursuant to Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as now in force or afterwards amended.

THIRD: This trust is established for the purpose of operating a non profit educational broadcast station in Dry Prong, Louisiana.

A. The principal and income of all property received and accepted by the trustees to be administered under this Declaration of Trust shall be held in trust by them, and the trustees may make payments or distributions from income or principal or both to or for the use of such charitable organizations, within the meaning of that term as defined in paragraph C, on such amounts and for such charitable purposes of the trust as the trustees shall from time-to-time select and determine; and the trustees shall make payments or

distributions from income or principal or both, directly for such charitable purposes, within the meaning of that term as defined in paragraph D, in such amounts as the trustees shall from time-to-time select and determine without making use of any other charitable organization: provided, however, that the trustees shall at least annually distribute such part of the current income or past accumulation of the income as is necessary to avoid unreasonable accumulation of income within the meaning of Section 504(a) (1) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 as now in force or afterwards amended. The trustees may also make payments or distributions of all or any part of the income or principal to states, territories or possessions of the United States, any political subdivision of any of the foregoing, or to the United States or the District of Columbia, but only for the charitable purposes within the meaning of the terms as defined in paragraph D. Income or principal derived from contributions by corporations shall be distributed by the trustees for use solely by programs based in the United States. No part of the net earnings of this trust shall inure or be payable to or for the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no substantial part of the activities of this trust shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, or the participation in or intervention in (including the publishing or distributing of statements), any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

B. The trust shall continue forever unless the trustees terminate it and distribute all of the principal and income, which action may be taken by the trustees in their discretion at any time. On such termination, the trust fund as then constituted shall be distributed to or for the use of such charitable organizations, in such amounts and for such charitable purposes as the trustees shall then select and determine. The Donor authorizes and empowers the trustees to form and organize a non profit corporation limited to the uses and purposes provided for in this Declaration of Trust, such corporation to be organized to have the power to administer and control the affairs and property and to carry out the uses, objects and purposes of this trust. Upon the creation and organization of such corporation, the trustees are authorized and empowered to convey, transfer, and deliver to such corporation all the property and assets to which this trust may be or become entitled. The charter, By-laws, and other provision for the organization and management of such corporation and its affairs and property shall be such as the trustees shall determine, consistent with the provisions of this paragraph B.

C. In this Declaration of Trust, and in any amendments to it, references to "charitable organizations" or "charitable organization" mean corporations, trusts, funds, foundations, or community chests created or organized in the United States or in any of its possessions, whether under the laws of the United States, any state or territory, the District of Columbia, or any possession of the United States, organized and operated exclusively for charitable purposes, no part of the net earnings of which inures or is payable to or for the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no substantial part of the activities of which is carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation and which do not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distributing of statements), any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. It is intended that the organization described in this paragraph C shall be entitled to exemption from Federal Income Tax under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as now in force or afterwards amended.

D. In this Declaration of Trust and in any amendments to it, the term "charitable purposes" shall be limited to and shall include only religious, charitable, scientific, literary, or educational purposes within the meaning of those terms as used in Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, but only such purposes as also constitute public charitable purposes under the law of trusts of Louisiana.

FOURTH: This Declaration of Trust may be amended at any time or times by written instrument or instruments signed and sealed by the trustees, and acknowledged by any of the trustees, provided that no amendment shall authorize the trustees to conduct the affairs of this trust in any manner or for any purpose contrary to the provisions of Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 as now in force or afterwards amended. An amendment of the provisions of this Article Fourth (or any amendment to it) shall be valid only if and to the extent that such amendment further restricts the trustees' amending power. All instruments amending this Declaration of Trust shall be noted upon or kept attached to the executed original of this Declaration of Trust held by the trustees.

FIFTH:

A. Any trustee under this Declaration of Trust may by written instrument, signed and acknowledged, resign his office. The number of trustees shall be at all times not less than two, and whenever for any reason the number is reduced to one, there shall be, and at any other time there may be, appointed one or more additional trustees. Appointments shall be made by the trustee or trustees for the time in office by written instruments signed and acknowledged. Any succeeding or additional trustee shall, upon his acceptance of the office by written instrument signed and acknowledged, have the same powers, rights, and duties and the same title to the trust estate jointly with the surviving or remaining trustee or trustees as if originally appointed.

B. None of the trustees shall be required to furnish any bond or surety. None of them shall be responsible or liable for the acts or omissions of any other of the trustees or of any predecessor or of a custodian, agent, depository, or counsel selected with reasonable care.

C. The one or more trustees, whether original or successor, for the time being in office, shall have full authority to act even though one or more vacancies may exist. A trustee may, by appropriate written instrument, delegate all or any part of his powers to another or others of the trustees for such periods and subject to such conditions as such delegating trustee may determine.

D. The trustees serving under this Declaration of Trust are authorized to pay to themselves amounts for reasonable expenses incurred and reasonable compensation for services rendered in the administration of this trust.

SIXTH: In extension and not in limitation of the common law and statutory powers of trustees and other powers granted in this Declaration of Trust, the trustees shall have the following discretionary powers:

A. To invest and reinvest the principal and income of the trust in such property, real, personal, or mixed, and in such manner as they shall deem proper, and from time-to-time to change investments as they deem advisable; to invest in or retain any stocks, shares, bonds, notes, obligations, or personal or real property (including without limitations any interests in or obligations of any corporation, association, business, trust, investment trust common trust fund, or investment company) although some or all of the property so acquired or retained is of a kind or size which but for this express authority would not be considered proper and although all of the trust funds are invested in the securities of one company; provided, however, that the trustees shall not invest the property of the trust in such a manner as to violate Section 504(a) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 as now in force or as afterward amended. No principal or income; however, shall be loaned, directly or indirectly, to any trustee or to anyone else, corporate or otherwise, who has at any time made a contribution to this trust, nor to anyone except on the basis of an adequate interest

charge and with adequate security.

B. To sell, lease or exchange any personal mixed, or real property, at public auction or by private contract, for such consideration and on such terms as to credit or otherwise, and to make such contracts and enter into such undertakings relating to the trust property, as they consider advisable, whether or not such leases or contracts may extend beyond the duration of the trust.

C. To borrow money for such periods, at such rates of interest, and upon such terms as the trustees consider advisable, and as security for such loans to mortgage or pledge any real or personal property with or without power of sale; to acquire or hold any real or personal subject to any mortgage or pledge; and to assume any mortgage or pledge on or of property acquired or held by this trust.

D. To execute and deliver deeds, assignments, transfers, mortgages, pledges, leases, covenants, contracts, promissory notes, releases, and other instruments, sealed or unsealed, incident to any transaction in which they engage.

E. To vote, to give proxies, to participate in the reorganization, merger or consolidation of any concern, or in the sale, lease, disposition, or distribution of its assets; to join with other security holders in acting through a committee, depositary, or trustees and to deposit securities with them or transfer securities to them; to pay assessments levied on securities or to exercise subscription rights in respect to securities.

F. To employ a bank or trust company as custodian of any funds or securities and to delegate to it such powers as they deem appropriate; to hold trust property without indication of fiduciary capacity but only in the name of a registered nominee, provided the trust property is at all times identified as such on the books of the trust; to keep any or all of the trust property or funds in any place or places in the United States of America; to employ clerks, accountants, investment counsel, investment agents and any special services and to pay the reasonable compensation and expenses of all such services in addition to the compensation of the trustees.


SEVENTH: The trustees' powers are exercisable solely in fiduciary capacity consistent with and in furtherance of the charitable purposes of this trust as specified in the Article Three and not otherwise.


EIGHTH: In this Declaration of Trust and in any amendment to it, references to "trustees" mean the one or more trustees, whether original or successor, for the time being in office.

NINTH: Any person may rely on a copy, certified by a notary public, of the executed original of this Declaration of Trust held by the trustees, and of any of the notations on it and writings attached to it, as fully as he might rely on the original documents themselves. Any such person may rely fully on any statements of fact certified by anyone who appears from such original documents or from such certified copy to be a trustee under this Declaration of Trust. No one dealing with the trustees need inquire concerning the validity of anything the trustees purport to do. No one dealing with the trustees need see to the application of anything paid or transferred to or upon the order of the trustees or the trust.

TENTH: This Declaration of Trust is to be governed in all respects by the laws of Louisiana.


