The only thing I read about that is mentioned throughout the instant Notice of Proposed Rulemaking as noted by the Commission, includes the comments and implied interests of large broadcasting companies with their inclusive 100,000-watt power, Class C status, and their historically "truly" protected Full Service radio stations. These stations operate all over America including, but not limited to, the large and the very largest of Metropolitan Markets on one end. Then at the other end where these large broadcasting companies are commenting and promoting certainty of operation for the small, secondary service translators that exist and operate, but not limited to, in the very same large and very largest of Metropolitan Markets. Many of these large, metropolitan broadcast companies lease their valuable and multiple digital HD channels to translator operators within their same market(s) for money and gainful profit.

I believe the Commission's proposal addressing Translator issues is great and will save much Time and Resources if implemented for ALL parties, including the FCC, ALL Full-Service Stations and their licensees, and ALL translator licensees and applicants.

I offer Comment in this proceeding and respectfully ask this Commission to carefully consider the plight of the small Full-Service radio station operator like me. I am a woman however there are many others like me including small Full-Service radio station owners and operators, including minority owned and religious broadcasters, along with others. I am talking about all the other classes of stations, A, C3, B1, etc. smaller market radio stations that are not specifically mentioned in detail in the instant proceeding.

As such, I am NOT in complete AGREEMENT with the proposal to modify Section 74.1203(a)(3) to state that "no complaint of actual interference will be considered actionable if the alleged interference occurs outside the desired station's 54 dBu contour".

You see, small lower powered Full-Service FM radio stations that operate in small and suburban markets throughout the United States rely, market, and program featured entertainment and public interest to their own listeners... within AND around their 54 dBu signal contours, especially since new radio receivers are so good today.

We need to be heard, and respectfully ask the Commission to include us and the many other small Full-Service radio stations like us in MM Docket 18-119.

Specifically, we respectfully request the Commission to consider the proposal to modify Section 74.1203(a)(3) to state that "no complaint of actual interference will be considered actionable if the alleged interference occurs outside the desired station's 48 dBu contour". At least the Commission please consider, in the alternative, protection from interference to the "desired station's 50 dBu contour."

Thank you for your consideration and hard work on revitalization issues such as this and bringing it forth to the public and asking for Comment.
