Dear FCC,

I work as an IT manager in San Francisco in a high rise office building downtown, 45 Fremont Street. No one believes me when I tell them that I work at the epicenter of technology and yet my options for telecommunications are limited. The barriers to entry for new providers of broadband data are too high for even Comcast, a company with deep pockets to make inroads. The lack of competition in this calcified broadband environment is an obstacle for our business.

At home I have even fewer options. I can't switch to Spectrum for broadband service because my neighbor has Comcast and a local ordinance disallows multiple drops of the same kind of service to the same home. I have few options because of geography and have found options that include the existing copper infrastructure critically important.

The service I receive from Sonic's DSL offering is stellar. Their ability to provide service to me makes me want to pay for it. I prefer supporting a service that helps me to be productive in an increasingly connected world as opposed to having an adversarial relationship with a vendor that consistently seeks to monopolize.
