On June 17, 2016, B. Lynn Follansbee of USTelecom, Scott Bergmann of CTIA, Ann Berkowitz and Robert Morse of Verizon, Jeb Benedict of CenturyLink, Hank Hultquist of AT&T, Mary McManus of Comcast and Michele Thomas of T-Mobile (via phone) met with Diane Cornell, Counsel to Chairman Wheeler. On June 20, 2016, B. Lynn Follansbee of USTelecom, Scott Bergmann of CTIA, Ann Berkowitz and Robert Morse of Verizon, Jeb Benedict of CenturyLink, Hank Hultquist of AT&T and Teri Ohta of T-Mobile (by phone) met with Amy Bender, Legal Advisor to Commissioner O’Rielly. On June 21, 2016, B. Lynn Follansbee of USTelecom, Krista Witanowski of CTIA, Ann Berkowitz and Robert Morse of Verizon, Jeb Benedict of CenturyLink, Jim Smith of AT&T, Jennifer McKee of NCTA and Indra Chalk and Kolton Ray of T-Mobile attended individual meetings with Nick Degani and Matt Butler of Commissioner Pai’s office and Travis Litman, Legal Advisor to Commissioner Rosenworcel. The purpose of all of the meetings was to discuss the Local Number Portability Administrator (LNPA) transition.

Specifically, the parties expressed the importance of the Commission promptly voting to approve the Master Services Agreement (MSA) between the NAPM, LLC and Telcordia d/b/a iconectiv. The parties stated that the approval of the agreement is a prerequisite to the continued progress of the transition and that there are mounting costs to consumers for every day the transition is delayed.

The parties noted that all segments of the industry support the MSA and that those opposed to approval of the MSA and moving forward with the transition have had ample opportunity to be a part of the process by participating with the NAPM since the beginning and through participation in Commission- and NAPM-provided opportunities for public input, and have had all of their concerns addressed throughout the process. The parties in attendance reiterated that security issues have been exhaustively addressed and resolved and with the Commission staff and with the approval of relevant

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federal government stakeholders. In addition, as previously determined, the cost savings in selecting Telcordia are exponential and would provide significant savings not only to companies of all sizes, but more importantly to consumers.¹

The industry members represented in these meetings continue to view the transition to Telcordia as LNPA as a positive change for companies and consumers alike. The transition will provide significant cost savings across the board and provide improved service and data security above and beyond what is provided today. As such, we request that the FCC vote to promptly approve the MSA between Telcordia and NAPM that will allow the transition process to continue expeditiously.
