

Re: *Globalstar, Inc. Petition for Notice of Inquiry Regarding the Operation of
Outdoor U-NII-1 Devices in the 5 GHz Band – RM-11808*

Dear Ms. Dortch:

One Solution Position (“OSP”) is a thirty-employee company based in Bogota, Colombia that has worked in partnership with Globalstar for over ten years. OSP has developed products based on Globalstar’s mobile satellite service (“MSS”) equipment and technology. OSP has customer relationships with major government and military organizations in Colombia.

It is very important to OSP that Globalstar’s MSS network can operate on a long-term basis free of harmful interference. OSP understands from its review of Globalstar’s recent Petition for Notice of Inquiry that an unlimited deployment of outdoor, high-power access points in the U-NII-1 band has resulted in a rapid noise rise in Globalstar’s feeder link spectrum over the past three years. Without FCC action, this noise rise will cause severe interference to Globalstar’s MSS offerings in the near future. This situation is not acceptable to OSP, which relies heavily on Globalstar’s MSS network and technology. Rather than sit back and wait for this harm to occur, the FCC should move quickly to issue a Notice of Inquiry on these important interference issues.
