To whom it may concern,

I own and operate AirFi, Inc. a Georgia based wireless internet service provider. I began operations just over a year ago and am excited to be a small part the rapidly changing communications industry.

Prior to launching AirFi, I spent several years researching the spectrum plans and have built my business around the promise of LTE development surrounding the upcoming CBRS initiative.

As a small operator, I am excited about the opportunity to apply for GAA usage as I may not have the funds available at auction time to bid on any census tracts in my service area.

Currently we are deploying 2.4 & 5GHz radio's as we strengthen our network backbone and prepare for 3.65 GHz. In the rural Central Georgia market we serve, tall dense Pine trees limit our coverage areas currently and we anticipate LTE deployment across our network will triple or quadruple the numbers of households we are able to serve.

With AT&T being the majority share internet service provider in our service area, we appreciate the opportunity the FCC is affording us by allocating select portions of the CBRS band for GAA usage. The number of under-served households in this market is staggering, and we feel the currently proposed spectrum plan for CBRS is our first chance to compete head to head with AT&T.

In closing I'd like to address the recent CTIA & T-Mobile petitions. As an operator, I know you understand my opposition to shrinking competition and allowing big money to pressure political change. From a small business investment/investor viewpoint - a change like this would be a death sentence for any/all future WISP funding. In their eyes, we'd be sinking fast in a losing battle.

I hope you'll take my thoughts in consideration as you review the aforementioned petitions. Thank you for your time.
