Below are my comments:

Efax's never use the recipient's server, modem, or facsimile machine or even a telephone line neither does the sender these days. The recipient uses tcp/ip to accept the transmission directly to email by-passing any of the statutory defined requirements. If it doesn't meet the statutory requirements of a violation under the TCPA it's not a violation of a statutory law. Its not very complicated, its common sense. There's no statutory facsimile damages specified in TCPA.

Electronic transmissions such as efax's and email transmissions do not use "telephone lines" at all. A digital transmission or efax etc all are sent by tcp/ip (internet), never touching a "telephone line or POTS" at any point. In fact, if a original digital transmission is sent via tcp/ip it may or may not ever be converted into using a "telephone line" and may have problems being received on a statutory defined fax machine that uses paper, toner etc.

If you receive a fax by email you understand that you potentially converted and older statutory defined telephone line fax machine (which don't really exist anymore) purposely into a email so you wouldn't use paper or toner etc. Its just not a fax, its an email.
