Most people in phone companies stare at computers all day long so this shouldn't be too hard.



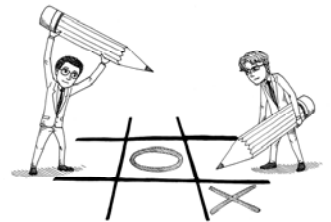
8. Arm Wrestling!

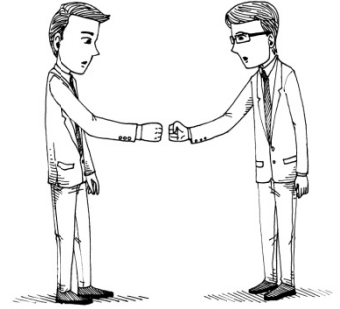


5. Rock Paper Scissors!
No we're all required to use ROC now

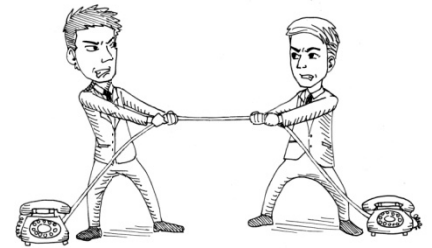


4. Call in Votes like American Idol! Then we'd use a toll free number to decide toll free numbers
