Dear Ms. Dortch:

On September 7, 2018, Claude Aiken, President & CEO of the Wireless Internet Service Providers Association (“WISPA”), and undersigned counsel to WISPA met with Commissioner Brendan Carr and his Legal Advisor Will Adams to discuss certain aspects of the above-referenced proceeding.<sup>1</sup>

The WISPA representatives reiterated the need for the Commission to retain at least two Priority Access Licenses (“PAL”) in every market based on census tracts. We emphasized that the recent success of fixed wireless broadband providers in the Commission’s recently concluded Connect America Fund (“CAF”) Phase II reverse auction made it even more critical for the 3550-3700 MHz band to be available to enable cost-effective and expeditious build-out, and would help protect the Commission’s investment in CAF subsidies.<sup>2</sup> We stated that WISPA’s willingness to agree to only two census tract PALs was incorporated into a broad coalition

proposal that included all stakeholders other than the mobile carriers, and sought to create the appropriate balance necessary to enable rural broadband, IIoT, and 5G services to develop in the band.<sup>3</sup> We also noted that because PALs are licensed in exclusive areas, they are more attractive for investors than General Authorized Access spectrum.

We also discussed PAL auction design techniques that would enable a successful auction among a large number of bidders with diverse business models, explaining that the Commission has, in the past, auctioned different sized geographic area licenses in the same auction and recently completed the CAF auction that involved more than 30,000 Census Block Groups. The Commission's policy decisions have historically driven the design for Commission auctions, and we believe the same approach should be taken here. To the extent there are software design issues associated with a PAL auction involving census tracts, we pointed out that the Commission has scheduled other spectrum auctions for the next year or so, and that there should be sufficient time for the Commission to develop software to accommodate census tract PAL auctions. We expressed our strong interest in remaining engaged with the Commission on auction design issues as the pending CBRs proceeding is finalized.
