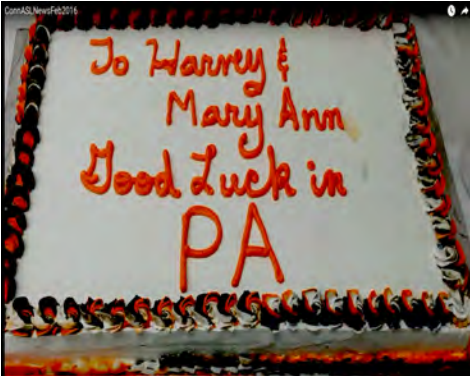

Greetings to all CAD members,

As you can see by our newsletter, CAD has been busy with activities involved in many recent events. I hope you enjoy sharing our newsletter pictures and stories, as we continue our efforts to advocate for opportunities and access in our beautiful State of Connecticut.

Recently, our Deaf community beamed with pride as we watched Nyle DiMarco win on Dancing with the Stars. While we extend our congratulations to Nyle, we also should take a moment to reflect on what this means for the Deaf community. Nyle has raised awareness of deaf issues, our language and our culture like never before. While people become more aware of deafness, I feel that it is our time to do our part. Each one of us, collectively has experience to share, and can have a sphere of influence. If we each take time, with patience, I believe we can make a difference.

As an example, while Nyle was competing on Dancing with the Stars, after each weeks' dance session, there were many playback videos on the internet, on Facebook and on other social media sites. I noticed that whenever a video was posted on another site, the video would lose the caption that had been originally broadcast by ABC. If we were to advocate for issues like this, we can raise awareness.

I don't think that ABC is aware that the rebroadcast of their videos did not have their original caption. It is up to us to make them aware. At the same time we can recognize ABC's ability to make a difference, and to join us in our advocacy by requiring rebroadcast to include the captions. This sounds so simple, but unfortunately the world is not aware of these issues.

This is our time. We need to become more active in raising awareness of deaf culture, our language, and communication access. We need to share our experiences with the appropriate parties in an attempt to educate America about our lack of access. Let's all stand behind Nyle DiMarco as he pushes for ASL civil, human and linguistic rights. Together, we can make a difference.

News and Events

1) Jeff Bravin, ASD Executive Director, CCOSD President Sandra McGee, and Peter McGee, accompanied four ASD students and their high school teacher Kathy Falco to Washington, D.C. on March 2, 2016. They met with Congressman John Larson of East Hartford in his office at the Capitol Hill. They asked him to support by voting for Alice Cogswell and Anne Sullivan Macy Act, H.R.3535. For further information, check www.asd-1817.org about H.R. 3535. Also, www.ceasd.org/child-first/alice-cogswell. Congressman John Larson will give ASD a USA flag that flies at the Capitol Building for ASD 200th Celebration. He congratulated ASD for its 200th anniversary. Also, he will ask the US Postmaster to develop a cachet of stamps honoring 200th anniversary of deaf education for ASD's celebration next year.

2) Keith Vinci, President of Connecticut RID (CRID) reported about NAD and RID. NAD has lost trust in RID due to financial mismanagement. So NAD no longer works with RID. Many new potential interpreters are upset that they cannot take tests to be certified. Keith told us not to worry for CRID. His board members will volunteer to provide workshops. Some volunteers will contribute free interpreting services for funerals provided by DORS Interpreting Services Unit.

3) DORS –The advisory board meeting was held to report data about interpreting services and counseling services units. Serious issues for both units are burden of proof: 15 out of 20 interpreter requests were not filled every week due to shortage of interpreters' availabilities. The position for payroll is now vacant so it is important to have it filled as soon as possible. Only two workers Sara Gerhold and Patricia Clark work in the interpreting services unit. Also, 2 counselors' schedules are limited for travels so they have to use videophone to talk/counsel with their clients. Another serious issue is that there's a need for a male counselor and we need counselors who use fluent ASL!

4) Connecticut Retirement Colony (CRC) – The building has started and is progressing step by step. Jim Pedersen and Nancy, a hearing lady found a leaked water pipe in the lower level. Fortunately it was not flooded. They had it fixed.

5) SPRINT RELAY CONNECTICUT - There was a town hall meeting at DNEC in Norwich on Thursday, May 17, 2016. Art Moore and Michelle Vicino need your ideas, feedback and complaints. They will end PURA contract by June 30, 2017. There will be a PURA hearing in February, 2017 in New Britain. We need your support.

Alice Cogswell and Anne Sullivan Macy Act

Alice Cogswell and Anne Sullivan Macy Act, H.R. 3535

Named for the first deaf student to be formally educated in the U.S. and for Helen Keller's beloved teacher, respectively, the Alice Cogswell and Anne Sullivan Macy Act will strengthen the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act to improve results for deaf, hard of hearing, blind, visually impaired, and deaf-blind children, including those with additional disabilities. Among other things, this Act will:

- Require states to identify, locate, and evaluate children who are deaf, hard of hearing, blind, visually impaired, or deaf-blind regardless of formal disability category or classification so that all of these students, including those with additional disabilities, are counted and properly served.
- Expand knowledge about the scope and quality of special education and related services provided to students who are deaf, hard of hearing, blind, visually impaired, or deaf-blind through refined data collection that tracks these students, regardless of formal disability category or classification.
- Expect states to conduct strategic planning, and commit such planning to writing, to guarantee that all deaf, hard of hearing, blind, visually impaired, and deaf-blind students within each state receive all specialized instruction and services needed, provided by properly trained personnel.
- Enhance existing "special factors" provisions to ensure that they provide for: deaf and hard of hearing children's language and communication needs and other unique learning needs; blind and visually impaired children's needs related to the Expanded Core Curriculum, the body of services which teachers of students with visual impairments and related professions are expertly trained to provide; deaf-blind students' need for language, communication, access to environmental and educational information needed for learning and interaction, and other needs.
- Ramp up U.S. Department of Education responsibilities to monitor and report on states' compliance with their obligations with respect to instruction and services specifically provided to students who are deaf, hard of hearing, blind, visually impaired, or deaf-blind.
- Assist parents and educators of students who are deaf, hard of hearing, blind, visually impaired, or deaf-blind through regular and up-to-date written policy guidance from the U.S. Department of Education.
- Improve educational outcomes for students who are deaf-blind by updating relevant terminology, including intervener services as a related service, and ensuring the availability of trained and qualified personnel.
- Establish a national collaborative organizational resource, the Anne Sullivan Macy Center on Vision Loss and Educational Excellence, to proliferate evidence-based practices in the education of students with vision loss, to keep special educators current with the latest instructional methods, and to supplement state and local educational agency provision of the instruction and services of the Expanded Core Curriculum.

Relay Connecticut's Captioned Telephone Service

Relay Connecticut offers a captioned telephone service for people with hearing loss called CapTel®.

This service allows individuals who aren't able to follow conversations with traditional or amplified telephones to hear and read simultaneously what their callers are saying. The captions appear on the phone's display screen allowing people who have difficulty hearing the freedom of telephone access regardless of their hearing ability.

Through the Relay CT equipment distribution program, partnered with Converse Communications Corporation, CapTel phones are distributed for FREE to those who qualify! To qualify you must meet the following criteria:

- Full-time resident of Connecticut
- Have a hearing loss
- Be at least 8 years old (Parent consent is required for those under 18 years old)

Relay Connecticut gives users the choice of which CapTel model best suits their needs. Whether it's a model that only requires a traditional analog telephone line, OR a model that uses a high speed internet connection, there is a CapTel model that fits the bill.

Because it doesn't really matter which phone you use, what matters is that you can understand every word of the conversation. Using

Relay Connecticut gives you the confidence to enjoy calls again, knowing that the captions will help you to catch every word.

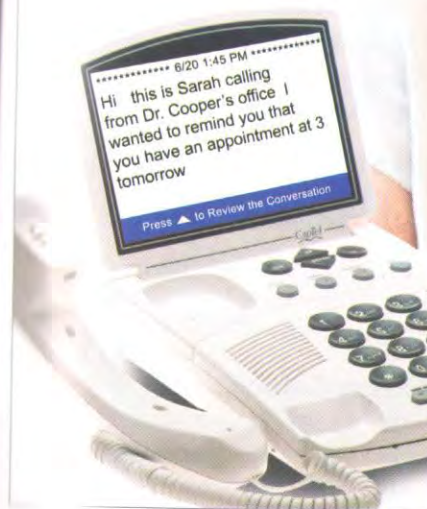

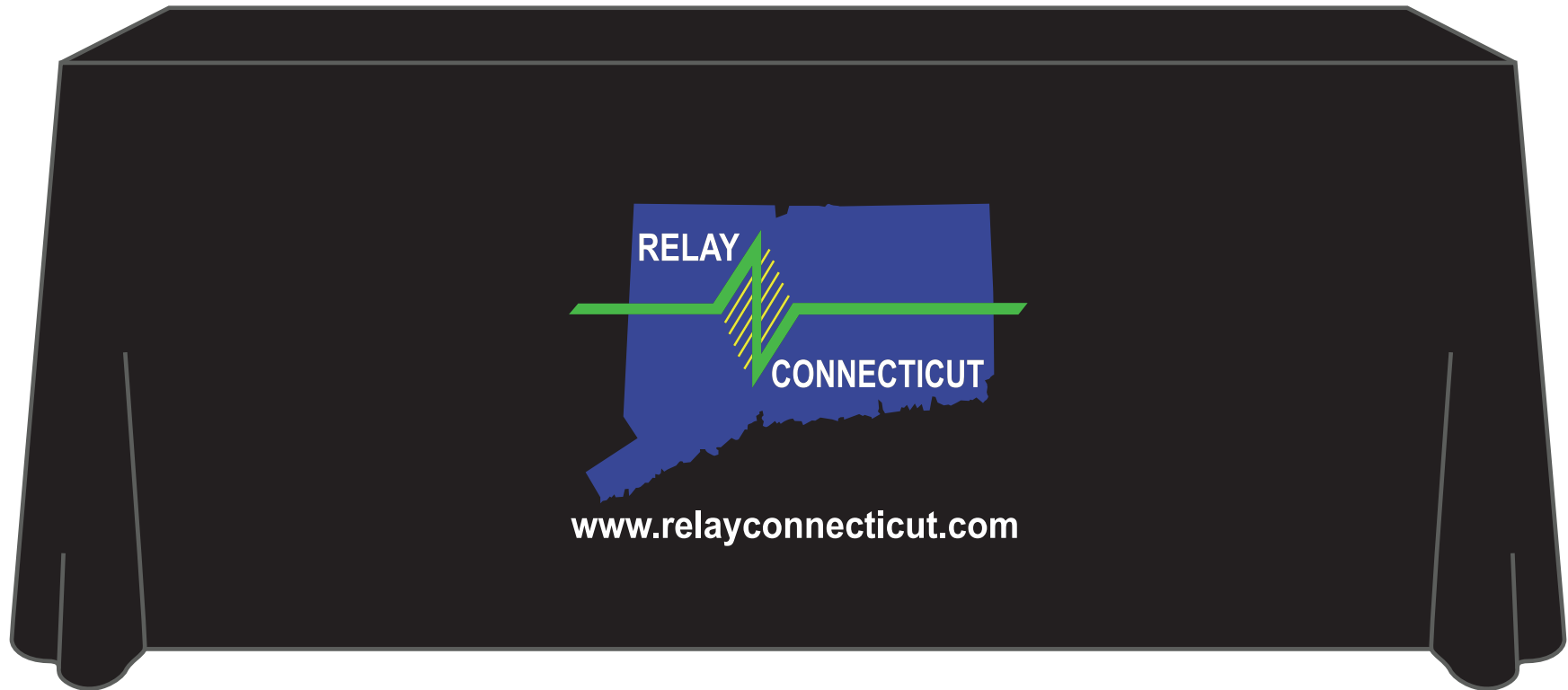

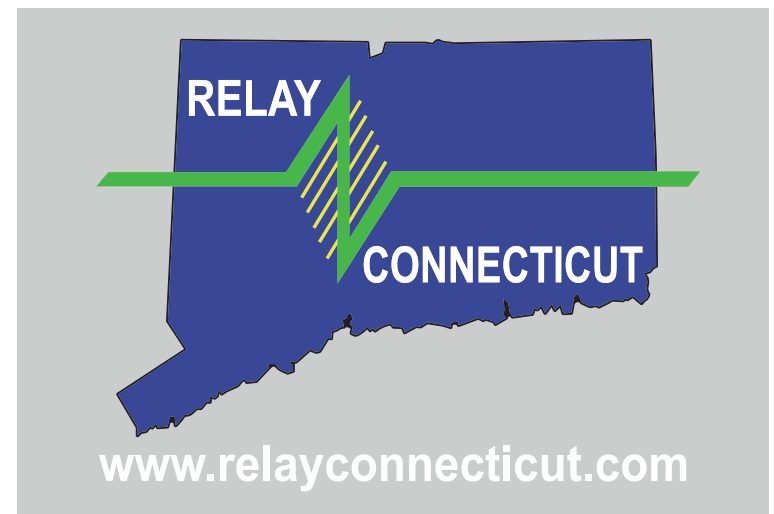
