

Dear FCC,

I am writing this letter in regards to recent aggressive deregulation measures taken upon Net Neutrality rules. In concise, you'll find some reasoning against this campaign.

Current open internet rules ( Net Neutrality rules) in place are invaluable to me and anyone I know and I support them fully, research for school, applications for potential employment opportunities, freedom of expression, to spreading of ideas and knowledge that you can only find through the internet, it hosts so much for anyone with access to it.
