

Tampa's MacDill Air Force Base, a few steps from closure just two years ago, turned out to be Florida's big winner Friday in a new round of recommended base closings that would eliminate 11,600 jobs elsewhere in the state.

MacDill employs 6,145 civilian and military personnel and pumps \$ 1-billion into the local economy, so Tampa Bay area officials were relieved with Friday's news. But they are wary of possible changes by the base closure commission, which holds its first meeting next week.

"We feel that this gives us a great deal of hope for MacDill, but by no means do we feel we're out of the woods," said developer Al Austin, who is co-chairman of the local MacDill Response Team. "The one thing that we have to be very concerned about is that we are still in a period where a lot of things can happen."

Florida's total job loss ranks third among the states on Aspin's list. The hardest hit is California, which is to lose 31,747 military and civilian positions and eight bases. Second highest is South Carolina, losing 17,443 positions.

President Clinton's home state of Arkansas stands to lose only 14 jobs and two small facilities.

Nationwide, the recommended cutbacks are intended to save \$ 3.1-billion a year, once the long process of shutdown is completed in 2000, Aspin said. Combined with the last two rounds of closures, ordered in 1988 and 1991, the government will have shut 73 major installations at a savings of \$ 5.6-billion a year after the 1993 proposal is approved.

To soften the blow, Clinton is proposing \$ 20-billion over the next five years to retrain military workers, retool defense firms and help hard-hit communities. His aides realize the defense drawdown will put a further drag on the shaky economy.

"It dramatically impacts almost immediately on housing markets and it certainly impacts on the whole small-business community," said Leon Panetta, the White House budget director.

MacDill's situation today is virtually opposite from that of two years ago, when then-Defense Secretary Dick Cheney recommended that the Tampa base be "partially closed" and the airstrip shut. For a time, the base closure commission threatened to close it entirely, but the panel eventually endorsed Cheney's recommendation.

Since then, Tampa Bay area politicians have tried to move government agencies that use airplanes to the base so the runway will stay open. Without a working airstrip, MacDill was an attractive candidate for shutdown this year.

Hurricane Andrew helped MacDill's fate. So did then-President Bush, who came to Pinellas County during a campaign trip and ordered the transfer of a dozen National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration planes from South Florida to MacDill.

Also, U.S. Rep. C. W. Bill Young, R-Indian Rocks Beach, gained the support of the military commands at MacDill, who told the Pentagon that their special units need a working runway - especially for their covert operations.

"Those two commands are what saved us," said U.S. Rep. Sam Gibbons, D-Tampa.

On still another front, Young appealed to Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, to make MacDill the southern home for a unit of KC-135 tankers. The planes, which are the military version of a Boeing 707, refuel

What about Florida's bases?

Florida would lose 11,623 civilian and military jobs if Defense Secretary Les Aspin's recommendations are approved. In all, seven military facilities would be closed. Here is a look at the larger bases in Florida affected by the cutbacks:

April and May: Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission holds public hearings on the merits of Defense Secretary Les Aspin's list of recommended closures.

June 1: Deadline for the commission to publish proposed changes to Aspin's


