Dear Mr. Klingebiel:

This is in reply to your letter to President Clinton regarding the Notice of Proposed Rule Making (Notice) in PR Docket No. 92-238, 57 FR 54034 (1992). This Notice proposes comprehensive changes to the Commission's Rules governing the private land mobile radio services operating in the frequency bands below 512 MHz.

You are specifically concerned about the impact of these changes on radio control (R/C) hobby users. Enclosed is a discussion paper concerning our proposals for the 72-76 MHz band. In short, we expect there would be no adverse impact on R/C operations because of any proposal contained in the Notice.

We are, of course, sensitive to the concerns of both users of private land mobile radio spectrum and R/C hobbyists. We will, therefore, take your concerns into account when we develop final rules in this proceeding. As indicated in the Notice, we remain convinced that without significant regulatory change in radio operations in the bands below 512 MHz, the quality of communications in the private land mobile radio services will continue to deteriorate to the point of endangering public safety and the national economy.

We want to thank you for your interest. Your letter will be included in the record of the proceeding. We expect final rules to be issued in 1994.




The attached correspondence is being returned for transfer to the Federal Communications Commission. The writer is concerned about radio frequencies and mentions the FCC in his letter.

Thank you so much for your letter. President Clinton greatly appreciates the trust and confidence you have expressed in him by writing.

To give your concerns the special attention they deserve, the President has asked me to forward your letter to the Department of Transportation. I have asked them to provide you with a prompt reply, but please bear in mind that it may take several weeks to look thoroughly into the concerns you have raised. Should you have any questions after reviewing their response to

feet and weigh between 10-40+ pounds, they are capable of causing serious injury if interference causes the operator to lose control of the aircraft. If the number of useable frequencies is diminished as proposed by the FCC in PR Docket 92-235, the remaining frequencies will become congested and the margin of safety will be greatly decreased.

I do not think it is wise for the FCC to seek to improve the operating conditions of land mobile radio users at the expense of radio control modelers. The FCC may not think we are as important as business users of radios, but we modelers are providing a service to our communities in training our youth about the exciting field of aviation and the principles of flight. The hobby provides many hours of enjoyment to tens of thousands of people like myself and contributes to the advancement and development of the commercial aviation industry.


