

purposes of the trust as the trustees shall from time-to-time select and determine; and the trustees may make payments or distributions from income or principle, or both, directly for such charitable purposes, within the meaning of that term as defined in paragraph D, in such amounts as the trustees shall from time-to-time select and determine without making use of any other charitable organization. The trustees may also make payments or distributions of all or any part of the income or principal to states, territories or possessions of the United States, any political subdivision of any of the foregoing, or to the United States or the District of Columbia, but only for the charitable purposes within the meaning of that term as defined in paragraph D. Income or principal derived from contributions by corporations shall be distributed by the trustees for use solely within the United States or its possessions. No part of the net earnings of this trust shall inure or be payable to or for the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no substantial part of the activities of this trust shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, or the participation in or intervention in (including the publishing or distributing of statements), any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

B. The trust shall continue forever unless the trustees terminate it and distribute all of the principal and income, which action may be taken by the trustees in their discretion at any time. On such termination, the trust fund as then constituted shall be distributed to or for the use of such charitable organizations, in such amounts and for such charitable purposes as the trustees shall then select and determine. The Donor authorizes and empowers the trustees to form and organize a nonprofit corporation limited to the uses and purposes provided for in this Declaration of Trust, such corporation to be organized under the laws of any state or under the laws of the United States as may be determined by the trustees; such corporation when organized to have power to administer and control the affairs and property and to carry out the uses, objects and purposes of this trust. Upon the creation and organization of such corporation, the trustees are authorized and empowered to convey, transfer, and deliver to such corporation all the property and assets to which this trust may be or become entitled. The charter, bylaws, and other provisions for the organization and management of such corporation and its affairs and property shall be such as the trustees shall determine, consistent with the provisions of this paragraph B.

C. In this Declaration of Trust, and in any amendments to it, references to "charitable organizations" or "charitable organization" mean corporations, trusts, funds, foundations, or community chests created or organized in the United States or in any of its possessions, whether under the laws of the United States, any state or territory, the District of Columbia, or any possession of the United States, organized and operated exclusively for charitable purposes, no part of the net earnings of which inures or is payable to or for the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no substantial part of the activities of which is carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting to

influence legislation, and which do not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements), any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. It is intended that the organization described in this paragraph C shall be entitled to exemption from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Code.

D. In this Declaration of Trust and in any amendments to it, the term "charitable purposes" shall be limited to and shall include only religious, charitable, scientific, literary, or educational purposes within the meaning of those terms as used in Section 501(c)(3) of the Code, but only such purposes as also constitute public charitable purposes under the laws of the State of Texas.

FOURTH: This Declaration of Trust may be amended at any time or times by written instrument or instruments signed and sealed by the trustees, and acknowledged by any of the trustees, provided that no amendment shall authorize the trustees to conduct the affairs of this trust in any manner or for any purpose contrary to the provisions of Section 501(c)(3) of the Code. An amendment of the provisions of this Article Fourth (or any amendment to it) shall be valid only if and to the extent that such amendment further restricts the trustees' amending power. All instruments amending this Declaration of Trust shall be noted upon or kept attached to the executed original of this Declaration of Trust held by the Trustees.

FIFTH: Any trustee under this Declaration of Trust may, by written instrument signed and acknowledged, resign his office. The number of trustees shall be at all times not less than two, and whenever for any reason the number is reduced to one, there shall be, and at any other time there may be, appointed one or more additional trustees. Appointments shall be made by the trustee or trustees for the time in office by written instruments signed and acknowledged. Any succeeding or additional trustee shall, upon his acceptance of the office by written instrument signed and acknowledged, have the same powers, rights and duties, and the same title to the trust estate jointly with the surviving or remaining trustee or trustees as if originally appointed.

None of the trustees shall be required to furnish any bond or surety. None of them shall be responsible or liable for the acts of omissions of any other of the trustees or of any predecessor or of a custodian, agent, depository, or counsel selected with reasonable care.

The one or more trustees, whether original or successor, for the time being in office, shall have full authority to act even though one or more vacancies may exist. A trustee may, by appropriate written instrument, delegate all or part of his powers to another or others of the trustees for such periods and subject to such conditions as such delegating trustee may determine.

The trustees serving under this Declaration of Trust are authorized to pay to themselves amounts for reasonable expenses incurred and reasonable compensation for services rendered in the administration of

this trust, but in no event shall any trustee who has made a contribution to this trust ever receive any compensation thereafter.

SIXTH: In extension and not in limitation of the common law and statutory powers of trustees and other powers granted in this Declaration of Trust, the trustees shall have the following discretionary powers:

A. To invest and reinvest the principal and income of the trust in such property, real, personal, or mixed, and in such manner as they shall deem proper, and from time to time to change investments as they deem advisable; to invest in or retain any stocks, shares, bonds, notes, obligations, or personal or real property (including without limitation any interests in or common trust fund, or investment company) although some or all of the property so acquired or retained is of a kind or size which but for this express authority would not be considered proper and although all of the trust funds are invested in the securities of one company. No principal or income, however, shall be loaned, directly or indirectly, to any trustee or to anyone else, corporate or otherwise, who has at any time made a contribution to this trust, nor to anyone except on the basis of an adequate interest charge and with adequate security.

B. To sell, lease or exchange any personal, mixed, or real property, at public auction or by private contract, for such consideration and on such terms as to credit or otherwise, and to make such contracts and enter into such undertakings relating to the trust property as they consider advisable, whether or not such leases or contracts may extend beyond the duration of this trust.

C. To borrow money for such periods, at such rates of interest, and upon such terms as the trustees consider advisable, and as security for such loans to mortgage or pledge any real or personal property with or without power of sale; to acquire or hold any real or personal property, subject to any mortgage or pledge on or of property acquired or held by this trust.

D. To execute and deliver deeds, assignments, transfers, mortgages, pledges, leases, covenants, contracts, promissory notes, releases, and other instruments, sealed or unsealed, incident to any transaction in which they engage.

E. To vote, to give proxies, to participate in the reorganization, merger or consolidation of any concern, or in the sale, lease, disposition, or distribution of its assets; to join with other security holders in acting through a committee, depository, voting trustees, or otherwise, and in this connection to delegate authority to such committee, depository, or trustees and to deposit securities with them or transfer securities to them; to pay assessments levied on securities or to exercise subscription rights in respect to securities.


F. To employ a bank or trust company as custodian of any funds or securities and to delegate to it such power as they deem appropriate; to hold trust property without indication of fiduciary capacity but only in the name of a registered nominee, provided the trust property is at all times identified as such on the books of the trust; to keep any or all of the trust property or funds in any place or places in the United States of America; to employ clerks, accountants, investment counsel, investment agents and any special services, and to pay the reasonable compensation and expenses of all such services in addition to the compensation of the trustees.

SEVENTH: The trustees' powers are exercisable solely in the fiduciary capacity consistent with and in furtherance of the charitable purposes of this Declaration of Trust as specified in Article Third and not otherwise.

EIGHTH: In this Declaration of Trust and in any amendment to it, references to "trustees" mean the one or more trustees, whether original or successor, for the time being in office.

NINTH: Any person may rely on a copy, certified by a notary public, of the executed original of the Declaration of Trust held by the trustees, and of any of the notations on it and writings attached to it, as fully as he might rely on the original documents themselves. Any such person may rely fully on any statements of fact certified by anyone who appears from such original documents or from such certified copy to be a trustee under this Declaration of Trust. No one dealing with the trustees need inquire concerning the validity of anything the trustees purport to do. No one dealing with the trustees need see to the application of anything paid or transferred to or upon the order of the trustees of the trust.

TENTH: This Declaration of Trust is to be governed in all respects by the laws of the State of Texas.

The purpose and objective of the applicant is to provide the city of Lubbock and surrounding communities with its own non-commercial radio station which will be broadcasting educationally oriented programs and events and news of local importance.

The proposed program policies of the radio station will be to broadcast educational material, public service programming, light entertainment, and non-denominational material that is of interest to the local citizens. See also the purposes and programs listed in Exhibits 1 and 6.

EXHIBIT 6**PROPOSED EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS****A. Continuing Educational Seminars**

Educational programming will focus on supplying learning opportunities in a "seminar" format. The subjects will feature a wide range of practical topics such as conversational Spanish, Gardening, Health, Finance, Self-improvement. Topics will be chosen for their appeal to a general audience which enjoys broadening their understanding of themselves and discovering the world around them.

Each "Seminar Session" begins after national and local news. The remaining 55 minutes are divided around four (4) five-minute informative talk segments taught by leading experts from the professional as well as educational areas. These talk segments are compressed informational packages designed to be assimilated by almost anyone. Each five-minute segment is followed by a musical interlude which provides the listener with a "listening assignment" to facilitate interaction and assimilation of the material just presented. The four talk segments form a cohesive hour's worth of information. Each seminar used Monday through Friday at a particular hour is continued for one month at that same hour. The cumulative total exposure to that seminar provides the listener with 6.67 hours of instruction (not counting the time spent during the musical listening assignments).

B. Remedial Instruction

In addition to instruction for the general audience, the Network will also provide school-age children remedial instruction in a program called "Homework Helper". Each day of the week is reserved for specific grade level instruction designed to support the curriculum generally pursued at the elementary and junior high level. For example, Mondays would be for Grades 1-2; Tuesdays, Grades 3 and 4; etc. Subjects covered would include basic remedial help in Math, History, Reading, and Science areas. These sessions would be given by leading professional educators. Written tutorial helps would also be provided at a nominal cost. These sessions are not designed to undermine the student's relationship with his teacher, but to complement his normal learning experience.

C. Minorities Seminars

Certain "Seminar Sessions" will focus on information of special interest to minorities issues. Some topics will deal with providing information on public services and how to get needed assistance. Other topic sessions will deal with bilingual issues. And other sessions will deal with economic needs, job skill training, and activist issues of importance to the minority audience. Local needs as determined from the ascertainment of community needs will receive first priority attention.

EXHIBIT 6

D. Senior Citizens Seminars

Some sessions will focus on the unique needs of senior citizens, featuring topics related to "how-to" and "where to find help" related issues. Initially, a survey of community needs will get important attention.

E. Handicap Seminars

A continuing segment of instruction programming will be designed to serve the unique needs of the handicapped. Reading for the sightless would be just one example of this type of programming. Other programs will focus on meeting needs as determined by community survey.

F. Repetitive Access

Because radio's audience is transient, these seminars must be also repeated at some time during the week so that those unable to hear the entire session can enjoy it later in the week. Each slightly edited seminar will be offered without any musical interruptions, in a format suitable for the listener to tape record during the early morning hours. Also, a written synopsis of each seminar is outlined and overall content will be provided in printed form. These will be locally distributed for a very nominal cost.

In summary, general educational programming comprising about 69.25 hours, per week is a major thrust of the station (and Network) to bring the learning process directly to the listener, on a more practical and informative level than most traditional educational programming has in the past. This is not to criticize other educational programming, but to suggest that this Network seeks to complement, not compete, in programming format with traditional educational radio formats.

The applicant initially has no authority to grant educational credit for work done via its programs. These presentations would thus constitute General Educational programming by the applicant. Approximately 41% of the initially proposed programs will be general education.

PROPOSED NEWS PROGRAMS

A. The Applicant will use the facilities of a national radio Network for primary coverage of national and international, and regional coverage. Each region of the United States will have its own network news bureau utilizing telephone reports and recorded releases from state and federal governmental agencies and non-governmental organizations and educational institutions. The Network programming will utilize the latest in satellite technology.

EXHIBIT 6

Local news will be secured by (1) attendance at key community meetings by station personnel, (2) telephone and recorded interviews with local newsmakers, (3) telephone reports from station staff on the scene of a particular news event, (4) direct contact of the station's staff with the community, and (5) material supplied to the station of the general public. The entire staff will participate in the news gathering process.

B. It is estimated that 25% of the news program time will be devoted to local and regional news during a typical broadcast week.
