1. My name is Alan Box. I am the President of EZ Communications, Inc., which owns all of the stock of Professional Broadcasting, Incorporated, which, in turn, owns all of the stock of the licensees of the following stations:

2. In addition, an application (BALH-930901GI) is pending which requests FCC approval for EZ Pittsburgh, Inc. to purchase radio station WQKB(FM) in New Kensington, Pennsylvania.

3. Applications are expected to be filed with the Commission in the near future seeking authority for EZ St. Louis, Inc. to acquire radio stations KUSA(AM)² and KSD-FM, St. Louis, Missouri, from Gannett Co., Inc. and for EZ Sacramento, Inc. to sell radio station KQBR(FM), Davis, California, and purchase KNCI(FM), Sacramento, California. In connection with these proposed purchases, it is anticipated that EZ



Statement of Edward "Tex" Meyer


I have been the General Manager of Radio Station WBZZ since March, 1984 and a Vice President of EZ Communications since the Fall of 1984.

Ever since I came to WBZZ, we have had auxiliary power facilities to permit the station to remain on the air during the periods of commercial power outage. While infrequent, power outages do occasionally occur during severe thunder storms, snow storms, and periods of high wind. The auxiliary power generator serves both our studio and transmitter, which are co-located, and kicks in immediately when there is a power outage. It is tested at least weekly and is serviced as needed. It has never failed.


We also have an auxiliary transmitter for use when our main transmitter is down for maintenance or, should it happen, when the main transmitter malfunctions.

STATEMENT OF ARTHUR KELLAR

My name is Arthur Kellar. I am the Chairman of the Board of Directors of EZ Communications, Inc. (EZ) which, through its subsidiary, Professional Broadcasting, Incorporated, owns and operates all of the EZ stations.

I personally control more than 70% of all combined Class A and Class B voting rights in EZ Communications.

I served in the U.S. Army from 1942-1945 and was awarded a Bronze Star. I attended American University in Washington, D. C. in 1946 and began my broadcast career as an air personality at WRON(AM) in Roncervet, West Virginia in 1947. In 1947, I was subsequently employed at WAND, Canton, Ohio. In 1948, I became an employee of WGEH(AM), Goldsboro, North Carolina and WFLB(AM), Fayetteville, North Carolina. In 1949, I joined WKWK(AM), Wheeling, West Virginia and in 1950 WJLS(AM), Beckley, West Virginia. I returned to WRON(AM) in Roncervet, West Virginia in 1950 and became an account executive with WEAM(AM), Arlington, Virginia in 1951. In 1952, I became the sales manager of WPIK(AM) in Alexandria, Virginia, and in the same year I constructed WEEL(AM) in Fairfax, Virginia. I was the president and principal shareholder of WEEL's licensee from 1956 to 1978, when it was sold. In 1955, I purchased WPRW(FM) in Manassas, Virginia and in 1967 I founded EZ Communications, Inc. which became the owner of the Manassas station and subsequently purchased WEZS(FM) in Richmond, Virginia, WEZC(FM) in Charlotte, North Carolina and WEZB(FM) in New Orleans, Louisiana (1972). EZ subsequently bought WBZZ(FM) in Pittsburgh, WHQT(FM), Coral

Gables, Florida, and KYKY(FM), St. Louis, Missouri. In 1986, EZ bought nine radio stations in Seattle, Sacramento, Fresno, Phoenix and Jacksonville from Affiliated Broadcasting Corporation.

The stations acquired from Affiliated in Fresno, Phoenix and Jacksonville were subsequently sold and EZ exchanged its FM station in Coral Gables for a second FM station in Charlotte in 1992. EZ purchased and subsequently sold radio station KUDA(FM), Pahrump, Nevada, in the late 1980's. It acquired WIOQ(FM) in Philadelphia in 1989.

I have been a director of EZ since 1967 and have served as the Chairman of its Board of Directors since 1968. I was the president of EZ from 1967 until 1985.

I am the father-in-law of Alan Box, EZ's current president.

I serve as a director of George Mason Bankshares, Inc. and American Medical Laboratories, Inc. in Virginia and am a trustee of George Mason University, which is also in Virginia.


Since 1985, I have devoted an average of about 5 hours a week specifically to matters relating to EZ's Pittsburgh broadcast operations and an additional 5 hours a week to matters which involve all of the EZ stations, including Pittsburgh. My contacts with our Pittsburgh operations include both personal visits three or four days a year (on one or two trips) as well as telephone conversations with the general manager of the station. In addition, I contact the Pittsburgh station and it contacts me through the use of EMail, which is a computer message trans-

mission system. There are quarterly managers' EZ meetings at which there are numerous group discussions about programming, EEO requirements, other personnel matters and sales activities, as well as visits by the Pittsburgh general manager to EZ's headquarters in Fairfax which, in general, occur at least several times a year. In addition, WBZZ's general manager is required to produce monthly and quarterly reports which provide detailed information about all aspects of the operation of the station, from technical matters to sales matters to programming and promotional activities. These reports are circularized among key EZ personnel and I myself regularly review the reports and, when appropriate, make comments about them. These contacts with our Pittsburgh operations have given me a detailed understanding of the particular needs and concerns of our operations there and, although day to day operations are normally overseen by EZ's president, Alan Box, I am familiar enough with WBZZ to participate fully in decisions affecting it, and do so.

The foregoing statements are true and are based on my personal knowledge.

STATEMENT OF ALAN BOX
ABOUT BROADCAST EXPERIENCE AND PITTSBURGH INTEGRATION

My name is Alan Box. I am the President of EZ Communications, Inc. (EZ) which, through subsidiaries, owns WBZZ(FM) in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

I joined EZ in 1974 as the general manager of the company's Manassas, Virginia radio station and became executive vice president and a director of the company in 1979. In 1985, I became the president of the company.

I am the son-in-law of Arthur Kellar, the Chairman of the Board of EZ, and I control 13.0% of the combined Class A and Class B votes of EZ stock. Mr. Kellar and I control more than 85% of the company's voting power.

I began my broadcasting career in high school and college working as an engineering assistant for PAMS, a company that produced radio jingles in Dallas, Texas. From 1970 to 1973 I worked in the sales department of TM Communications, Inc. which also recorded and produced radio jingles. I subsequently served from approximately 1984 to 1986 as a member of the board of directors of the publicly held TM Communications. As noted above, since 1974, I have worked in various capacities at EZ.

I have been a member of the board of directors of the National Association of Broadcasters since 1990 and, during the same period, have served as the Chairman of the NAB Digital/Audio Broadcast Task Force. I have also participated, at the request of the State Department and the NAB, in digital and broadcast

meetings in Canada and Mexico, and have been a director of George Mason Bankshares since 1990.

As the president of EZ, I am in direct charge of all of its broadcast stations, including WBZZ in Pittsburgh. Since at least 1985, I have devoted an average of eight to ten days annually to trips to our Pittsburgh station with each trip generally lasting two days. I am normally in daily contact with WBZZ's general manager and other key operating personnel at the station by telephone, computer transmissions (EMail) and other forms of communications.

WBZZ's general manager is required to produce monthly and quarterly reports which provide detailed information about all aspects of the operation of the station, from technical matters to sales matters to programming and promotional activities. These reports are circularized among key EZ personnel and I myself regularly review the reports.


I lead each of our quarterly managers' meetings which generally last from two to three days and include detailed discussions both individually with various key Pittsburgh employees and in group settings with all of EZ's general managers and, often, other key employees. In addition, Mr. Meyer, WBZZ's general manager, visits EZ's headquarters in Fairfax at least several times a year. As a result of these contacts, I am thoroughly familiar with our Pittsburgh operations and our efforts to meet and serve its community needs and interests. I estimate that I devote an average of at least four to five hours


Statement of Edward "Tex" Meyer

I have been the General Manager of Radio Station WBZZ since March, 1984 and a Vice President of EZ Communications since the Fall of 1984. I also own 5,600 shares of the Class A stock of EZ Communications. Typically, I devote 55-60 hours per week to my duties as General Manager of WBZZ. My broadcast experience prior to 1984 in summarized below.

I started out in broadcasting in 1961 as a newscaster and announcer. I then became the assistant program director of WOKY, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Following that, I was the program director at WGOW, in Chattanooga, Tennessee for three years. I moved from there to WMAK-AM, in Nashville, Tennessee, where I was the sales manager from 1977 until 1979. From 1979 until I assumed my duties with WBZZ in 1984, I was the general manager of radio station WWKX licensed to Gallatin, Tennessee, serving Nashville.

Statement of Alan Box
About WQKB(FM), New Kensington, Pennsylvania

1. My name is Alan Box. I am the President of EZ Communications, Inc. (EZ) which owns the licensee of radio station WBZZ(FM) in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and has an application pending before the Commission to acquire radio station WQKB(FM), New Kensington, Pennsylvania (BALH-930901GI).

2. Since January 1, 1993, EZ has had a Local Marketing Agreement (LMA) with the licensee of the station. Pursuant to the LMA, WBZZ sells time on the station and provides programming to it. The pending application which seeks to acquire WQKB(FM) is, as demonstrated in the application, in full compliance with the Commission's current multiple ownership policies since there are more than 15 stations in the Pittsburgh market and the combined audience share of WBZZ(FM) and WQKB(FM) is substantially less than 25%.

3. Prior to reaching an agreement to purchase WQKB(FM), WBZZ had operated in the same general market with the station and was very familiar with its history of operations. What is now WQKB was and is licensed to New Kensington, Pennsylvania, which is a suburb of Pittsburgh, approximately 20 miles northeast of the city. Several years ago, in an attempt to improve the station's coverage of the Pittsburgh market, its licensee moved its transmitter site from the New Kensington area to a Pittsburgh television tower. This move required the station to directionalize its signal and suppress radiation sharply to the southwest, west and northwest in order to protect an adjacent

channel short-spaced facility in Bellaire, Ohio and a co-channel station in Cleveland, Ohio. As a result, both at its original location and its present new location, WQKB has not had as good a signal as other Class B FM facilities serving the Pittsburgh market.

4. Because of its coverage deficiencies, WQKB has had difficulty competing on its own in the Pittsburgh market. For example, the current license from whom EZ is seeking to acquire the station, has not, it is my understanding, been able to operate the station profitably during the period of time that it has owned it.

5. Because of these technical deficiencies and resulting past difficulties in securing advertising support, a combination of its operations with those of WBZZ under the same licensee will permit operating efficiencies which will allow WQKB to continue to serve both as New Kensington's only local FM broadcast facility and as a competitive additional voice in the Pittsburgh market.
