Mathias Interviewed

— Bob Mathias, one of the "world's greatest athletes," was interviewed on "This Day" July 17th with Jerry Housholder on KFUO. Bob Mathias first gained worldwide attention at the age of 17 by winning the Olympic Decathlon gold medal in London. Four years later, at the 1952 Olympics in Helsinki, Finland, he repeated his victory, establishing a record as the world's first two-time Olympic decathlon champion. Mathias was elected to the U.S. Congress in 1966 to serve in the 90th Congress

and was re-elected to the 91st, 92nd, and 93rd Congresses. He was named Director of the U.S. Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs in June of 1977, where he remained until the end of the 1984 Olympics. In 1984, Mathias was made Director of the National Fitness Foundation in Indianapolis.




Between church and state

What specifically is the relationship between church and state? Who speaks to the state on the part of the church? The Commission on Theology and Church Relations of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod is examining these issues on a continuing basis.

In a recent KFUO interview with KFUO's Rev. Mark Hawkinson, the CTCR's Executive Director, Dr. Sam Nafzger, described the Biblical principles behind the civil responsibilities.

Nafzger stated that God instituted government to provide for the temporal peace and well-being of its citizens.

Nafzger points out, however, that whenever the state adopts a law (such as the abortion law) that contradicts God's law, Christians have the command in Scripture to follow God's law. He stresses the fact that the United States governmental system has made

Great Commission Convocation Executive Director John Meyer has been promoting this special event. Recently, he stopped at KFUO to interview with Rev. Mark Spitz.

During the interview, Meyer explained the convocation's theme, *Daring Discipleship*: "The five functions of the parish—witness, worship, fellowship, service and nurture—will be emphasized.

Through these five functions, our congregations enable us to be the 'daring disciples' we need to be in order to carry out Jesus' command to bring the Good News to all the world."

Jesus says in Matt. 28:18-20: "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the

name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things whatever I have commanded you; and behold, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." With the theme of *Daring Discipleship*, Meyer said, "The 1988 Great Commission Convocation will help congregations fulfill our Lord's mandate."

The goal of the Great Commission Convocation '88 is that congregational members of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, being disciples, will respond to the Lord's call to make disciples of others.

sions and handle the consequences of those decisions; learn the importance of making commitments and following through with those commitments; how to set and achieve goals; and how to handle adversity. Success in sports helps young people in life."

He also said that the self image can be enhanced at a much earlier age. "The motivation should come from within; while coaching is a real key, kids should want to be in the sport. It (gymnastics) should be a very fulfilling, enjoyable experience."

When Conner is not broadcasting, promoting or participating in gymnastics, he's speaking to and working with kids. He regularly gives advice on life and give tips on being a better athlete.



"There are ways that Christians can, under the protection of laws, disobey the laws by the way of working toward a change of those laws," concluded Nafzger.


Between church and state

What specifically is the relationship between church and state? Who speaks to the state on the part of the church? The Commission on Theology and Church Relations of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod is examining these issues on a continuing basis.

In a recent KFUF interview with KFUF's Rev. Mark Hawkinson, the CTCR's Executive Director, Dr. Sam Nafzger, described the Biblical principles behind the civil responsibilities.

Nafzger stated that God instituted government to provide for the temporal peace and well-being of its citizens.

Nafzger points out, however, that whenever the state adopts a law (such as the abortion law) that contradicts God's law, Christians have the command in Scripture to follow God's law. He stresses the fact that the United States governmental system has made

Recently, on the heels of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod's 1988 Great Commission Convocation, Rev. Mark Hawkinson, along with Jerry Housholder, interviewed Synod President Ralph A. Bohlmann.

Bohlmann proclaimed, as in his inspiring sermon during the GCC, that 2.5 million Lutheran Christians in our church body can be bold and daring disciples as were the apostles Peter and John, as shown in Acts.

"These men had no special training and no special courage. Just a few weeks before (they were) cowering behind a locked door; suddenly they're standing there in front of everyone telling them the great things Jesus Christ has done. They took note that they had been with Jesus."

Bohlmann said that the clue for us in this contemporary world is to convey that same sense to our countrymen and to one another . . . that we are people who have also been with Jesus.

Bohlmann said that as Lutheran Christians, people would want to witness to Jesus and His love. He said that the GCC reinforced this Great Commission of Christ through conveying the Word of God, prayer, preaching, worship and encouragement of one another.

Bohlmann said he views the office of president of The Lutheran Church—

Missouri Synod as a very specialized pastoral office . . . in certain areas, serving as pastor to 6,150 congregations of the Missouri Synod.

"As pastor, I think the foremost task is to proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ." Bohlmann said that he sees his role as having many dimensions . . . that of encourager, spokesman, witness and enabler . . . trying to make the various parts of the ecclesiastical machinery function harmoniously, so that "Christ is proclaimed and glorified in everything we do."

Bohlmann said that North America is, perhaps, the first and foremost LCMS mission field. "The focus of the major study (on world missions) that I

talked about at the convocation is going to be on North American missions, but also on the whole world mission of the church. . . . The time has come to evaluate how that work is going, how we can do it more effectively, and how more and more of our financial gifts from congregations in the U.S. can go toward helping others and (toward) helping bring others to Jesus Christ. . . ."

Bohlmann stated that the first goal of the LCMS congregations, now that the GCC is over, is to examine everything in the light of the Great Commission of "our Lord Jesus Christ." "Are the things we're doing being measured by that basic question, 'How does this advance the Great Commission of Jesus Christ?'" He also pointed out God's forgiveness even though we're not perfect.

On the future of the LCMS, Bohlmann's comments were very hopeful. "What I'd like to say is . . . that I hope that in 10 years we'd be twice as large as we are today, not that our success is measured entirely by size, but that would signal for me and a lot of us that our people have truly become mission-minded people, reaching out to their neighborhoods and bringing people to know the Lord Jesus Christ.

In reviewing the difficulties internally 15 years ago, Bohlmann said that he believes the church has emerged from that period with great strength in the Lutheran doctrine.

Bohlmann said that he, with the church body, now wants to use that strength of doctrine to "become more active in witness, evangelism, missions and outreach."

KMOX newscaster returns to KFUO

"Hello, this is Emil Wilde. You usually hear me in the role of interviewer of a person well qualified to answer questions of a more serious nature . . . arthritis, diabetes and so forth. Today just for a lark, I've gathered a group to question on a subject that could bring a few comments . . . the time a woman spends before work in the morning on her shower, hair and make-up. I suppose I'm already in trouble for just mentioning that. But never a timid soul, I'll dive in and see what I come up with."

Never a timid soul indeed, Emil Wilde dives right in and tackles any subject . . . light and humorous and earnest and enlightening for the news and public affairs features he produces weekdays on AM 850, KFUO.

Wilde explains that he is responsible for features that are of real interest to his audience: The church, health, education, gardening and cooking tips, fashion and more.

"People are very helpful in suggesting topics," exclaims Wilde. "I know they are truly benefiting from the program."

Some of Wilde's guests come into the KFUO studios, located on the seminary campus in Clayton, but he usually goes out to his guests—to a church, a

teacher's classroom, a doctor's office, a garden. Wilde's beat is wherever his beat takes him!

Semi-retired, you will find Wilde writing, interviewing and producing at KFUO every Tuesday and Thursday. He is happy to be back after a break from KFUO in 1957. He had served KFUO from 1940 to 1957. In the beginning he served in general announcing and public relations; later he served as the chief announcer, music director and production manager.

Wilde expresses fond memories of his service for the *Lutheran Hour*, in which he served as the weekly announcer on the Mutual Broadcasting System from 1947 to 1957.

Wilde's first challenge in broadcasting was his 15 minute piano recital, broadcast on KFUO when he was only 10 years old. Wilde was a student of voice and music from an early age. Later he majored in music at Washington University and continued his music education as a church organist and choir director.

Wilde found his childhood performance on KFUO fascinating. In later years it seemed quite natural for him to also make his singing debut on KFUO. After performing for only three weeks, an announcer posi-

tion opened up. After the competition, Wilde learned that he had won the position.

"Rev. Elmer Knoernschild was my announcing teacher at KFUO and he really taught me a lot," said Wilde. At that time, Knoernschild was the production manager; when he retired from KFUO, Wilde became KFUO's music director and production manager.

After 17 years at KFUO, Wilde went on to pursue a career in commercial broadcasting. Up to that time, Wilde's career somewhat overlapped as he served as an announcer for WIL Radio and as a night time booth announcer for KETC-TV.

Wilde demonstrated his knack for news as news

broadcaster and news writer for KWK Radio, then on to KSD Radio from 1969 to 1978. His news reports appeared on Channel 5 and he appeared regularly on a panel discussion, "Briefing Sessions," on KSD-TV.

In 1978 Wilde was hired at KMOX Radio as newscaster and writer, editor-in-chief for two years and writer for morning drive newscasts for Bob Hardy and Rex Davis.

Yes, Emil Wilde has returned to KFUO! "I found commercial radio rewarding and challenging but it is quite a pressure cooker," exclaims Wilde. "I longed for the return to the peace we have with our KFUO family," he responds contently.

A lamp unto my feet

Rev. Mark Hawkinson, KFUO manager of religious programming, conducts a daily interview during his "team" shift with KFUO Program Director Jerry Housholder between 8 and 9:30 a.m. weekdays. The following is a portion of a KFUO interview conducted by Hawkinson with guest Rev. Les Stahlke, executive director of LAMP.

Hawkinson: What is LAMP?

Stahlke: LAMP is the Lutheran Association of Missionaries and Pilots, an independent mission organization, assisting the Christian church in ministry in the sparsely-settled and physically isolated areas of Canada and the United States.

Hawkinson: How did LAMP become organized?

Stahlke: It started in 1970 when I was a pastor assigned to open a new mission congregation in a boomtown in northern Alberta . . . I began an experimental ministry, where I supported myself by doing bush flying and in the course of doing that flying, I found many Christians scattered around isolated villages, native and non-native Christians, who really had no spiritual support system. So we felt that using pastors, airplanes and

those scattered laypersons, we could share the Gospel in a very real way, even in isolated areas.

Hawkinson: One question that comes to mind . . . are all your missionaries pilots and are all of your pilots missionaries?

Stahlke: We think of the pilots as pastors and the missionaries as laypersons.

Hawkinson: How many provinces of Canada does LAMP presently serve?

Stahlke: We cover the northern portion of five provinces plus the western part of the Northwest Territories.

Hawkinson: LAMP is an independent Lutheran missionary society. What is your relationship to The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod?

Stahlke: I am personally a Missouri Synod pastor and I have a call from the Alberta-British Columbia District of the Missouri Synod to serve as Executive Director of LAMP.

Hawkinson: What sort of training is necessary over and above the seminary education and private pilot's license to become a pastor-pilot for LAMP?

Stahlke: The most important part of training for a pastor-pilot is in the area of ministry. . . . What we want is a pastor who has at least three years of parish experience, because when

we place him in the middle of nowhere, he's really on his own. He needs to have his own spiritual support system, personal support system and a great body of experience.

Hawkinson: There are just a few minutes left, quickly tell us, what are the challenges for the '90s?

Stahlke: We're covering a million and a half square miles and there's another two million to go.

Hawkinson: Our guest today on KFUO has been Rev. Les Stahlke, executive director of LAMP, Lutheran Association of Missionaries and Pilots. Thank you Rev. Stahlke. . . . God's blessings on your special ministry.

'The Reality of Satan'

"The Reality of Satan" was a five-part KFUE series prepared by KFUE's Emil Wilde that featured the Missouri Synod's Executive Director of the Commission on Organizations, Rev. Phil Lochhaas in late February.

Lochhaas explained that satanism is actually made up of two parts—those people who believe in Satan and worship him because they believe that through such worship they will gain secret knowledge and secret power that is not available to others; and those people who are really hedonistic and Satan is symbolic.

No matter, according to God's own revealed Word, Satan is real, a real being who has set himself up to destroy the works of God.

Lochhaas said that all indicators point to the rise in satanic worship is due to peer pressure and the search for identity and that there are youth who are, at least, dabbling in the occult.

He attributed some of the problem of satanism to the shape of today's society. "We live on such a high-energy level today that we're involved in so many exciting things that there must always be something new, something hidden, perhaps something forbidden, to whet our appetites."

Does the "New Age" parallel Satanism? Lochhaas said that, even though the "New Age" movement is

not directly Satanism, it does so parallel Satanism. "The 'New Age' has the idea that morals are purely relative, purely subjective, that truth is only what we perceive . . . the fact that there are no victims. Everyone chooses the existence he or she wants."

Do Satan worshipers resort to human sacrifice today? "Valid police reports from all over the United States have pointed to human sacrifice being discovered," reported Lochhaas, "People have been convicted to life imprisonment and to death row that have been convicted of satanic sacrifices. Our courts say that it does exist today."

Lochhaas pointed out the existence of satanic cults throughout the United States (particularly in Minnesota, Colorado, Chicago, Ill., and Nebraska) and other parts of the world, including Eastern and Western Germany.

Lochhaas said many things can lead to satanic worship, including pornography, physical abuse of others, Black Rock music, etc. He particularly warns against religions other than Christianity. "I think any religion that is not based totally in the revealed Word of God in Scripture, but admits other sources of divine revelation, has at least opened the door through which satanism can enter."

What as Christians can we do about satanism? "We

begin with ourselves," Lochhaas stressed. "We must see ourselves as the redeemed of God in Jesus Christ. We know that Satan has been conquered—that he has no power over us. 'Greater is He that is in you that he who is in the world.'"

Witnessing to the Jehovah's Witnesses

Kay Meyer from the International Lutheran Laymen's League was recently back to KFUE with a new series, "Witnessing to the Jehovah's Witness." The series, hosted by KFUE's Rev. Mark Spitz, covered the following subjects:

- Salvation—What Does God's Word Say?
- How to Witness to Jehovah's Witnesses Effectively
- Support Groups for Family Members
- Deciphering True Gospel from False Gospel
- Should We Defend the Gospel?

Meyer admitted that witnessing to any group that is what Christians consider a cult is probably the most difficult kind of witnessing. She said that Bible study, evangelism and regular church attendance are vital.

"It is essential that when we witness, we are using God's Word. If we don't know what He has said to us, then we are not going to be effective witnesses for Him."

Meyer covered a great deal of the material she has presented in written form

in witnessing to Jehovah's Witnesses. The KFUE broadcasts, that are also offered on cassette, engage the subjects of the Diety of Christ, the Humanity of Christ, the Holy Spirit and the Trinity.

"Witnessing to Jehovah's Witnesses about the Diety of Christ causes many Christians to turn away frustrated and disillusioned," said Meyer. "But the issue of Christ's diety must be addressed when speaking to them because they teach a false Christ."

Jehovah's Witnesses distort the true Bible teachings concerning Christ. Meyer explained that the two natures of Christ—true God and true man—must be brought out.

Christians teach that God's Holy Spirit lives within us and teaches us as we read and study His Word; that the Bible is the true Word of God; and we believe in the Triune God and the power of the Gospel message.

Meyer doesn't advocate that everyone is prepared or ready to witness to the Jehovah's Witnesses and that it can be dangerous. "If you really feel that the Lord wants you to witness, then continue to study, learn and grow. If you feel led by the Holy Spirit to speak to the next Jehovah's Witness who arrives at your door, do so. But do so, armed with God's Word and under the power of the Holy Spirit."



'The Lutheran Hour' speakers and Christian broadcasting

Special recordings of "The Lutheran Hour" were selected and aired by your Good News station, KFUO, in January in honor of Dr. Oswald Hoffmann. Hoffmann, who first broadcast "The Lutheran Hour" live in 1955, retired as "The Lutheran Hour" speaker on the 75th anniversary of his baptism.

In a live personal interview with Rev. Mark Spitz on KFUO's "Living With God" program, Hoffmann praised the new speaker of "The Lutheran Hour," Dr. Dale Meyer, and the associate speaker, Wallace Schulz; he gave his blessings for the internationally acclaimed Christian program to flourish. "The Lutheran Hour" will go on strength to strength. Nothing will please me more than to see that happen in the days ahead."

The laypeople of the church, as well as KFUO, received particular recognition by Hoffmann in the role each are playing in the process of spreading the Gospel. "It has been a mar-

velous experience to be cooperating in this way with the lay people of the church, sponsors of 'The Lutheran Hour.' That's good for the church body too, that the laypeople should be actively occupied in the direction and in the carrying out of the mission of the Church to people throughout the world . . . And this station [KFUO] has made a tremendous contribution. KFUO has been a pioneer in religious broadcasting."

Spitz accentuated the power of radio and how people cling to the words of dynamic Christian radio speakers like Dr. Hoffmann. "You are a link with everything else that is going on in the world."

"Radio has a peculiar facet," responded Hoffmann. "It brings news to people when it is still live. With television, you wait for pictures; otherwise, they're radio, too." Hoffmann went on to say that radio fills a great need in the world. "In fact, in many parts of the world to-

day, radio is still the major means of communication. Radio will be around a long, long time."

Hoffmann credited those who brought the beautiful music and the highest quality production to "The Lutheran Hour" over the years, making the program the grandfather of religious programs in the United States. But Hoffmann said that the Gospel is the major reason for the success of "The Lutheran Hour." "The Gospel is everything. You learn to take people to the cross every time you talk."

When the new speaker of "The Lutheran Hour," Dr. Dale Meyer, broadcasts on Easter Sunday, Hoffmann said he will be cheering on the sidelines. "I'm going to listen and appreciate what 'The Lutheran Hour' does for people throughout the world."

The new speaker of "The Lutheran Hour," Dr. Dale Meyer, was introduced by International Lutheran Laymen's League manager of public relations, Rev. Ron Schlegel, in February on KFUO's "Living With God," hosted by KFUO's Rev. Mark Spitz.

Meyer said that his travels and speaking engagements increase his knowledge of people and life and greatly influence his sermons for "The Lutheran Hour." He said that he is still learning how to use his voice to convey his feelings over the air, but he hopes that his personality will come through so that "people will start to relate to me as another child of God that they feel they know very well. . . . I very much

want to be a friend to all the listeners."

Meyer is certainly not a new voice to the KFUO listening audience. As the listeners conveyed to Meyer over the call-in program ["Living With God"], he will be missed on the "KFUO Sunday Morning Bible Class" from Holy Cross Lutheran Church, Collinsville, Ill., that aired on KFUO every Sunday morning at 9 and rebroadcast every Monday afternoon at 2:05. One listener commented that the "Sunday Morning Bible Class" "was good practice" in preparing for Meyer's new call in broadcast ministry.

Meyer was touched by the KFUO listeners' blessings and called for their prayers. "I appreciate the wish of our Father's blessings on this undertaking. . . . Every once in awhile I have a moment of terror, realizing the magnitude of 'The Lutheran Hour' and what is at stake . . . so I need God's blessings and we need, not only pray for 'The Lutheran Hour,' but for the congregations because that is where the people will, hopefully, find the Word and sacraments. We pray that 'The Lutheran Hour' will help in directing people to the congregations."

Meyer said that society has changed more than anyone can comprehend and that the Gospel is needed as never before. "This is the ministry of 'The Lutheran Hour' and, indeed, the ministry of our churches. Together we can bring the Good Word [the Word of God] to the people."
