Dear Mr. Canton,

We are a small private payphone company (800 phones) that is presently experiencing 62% (800 number dial around) and 17% (10xxx dial around for a total of 79%) of all calls that we receive no compensation for (except for the \$6/month).

Our phones cost \$2000 installed (located, installed, etc.). The line charges are \$40/month and the long distance charges average another \$50/month for a fixed cost of \$90/month per phone.

We rely heavily on the operator service commissions to make a modest profit and a fair 12% return on our investment of \$2000/location.

BPP would take away another 17% thus leaving us with 96% "dial around" or put another way; the public would be using our equipment 96% of the time for free.

Would you let someone drive your car; 94% of the time for free????

This is a capitalistic country where companies make investments for a fair return on their investments. If there is not a fair return on that investment, then the investments will not be made. Or put another way, there will not be any payphones for the public to use because no one would make the investment!

Unless the FCC is willing to start putting up hundreds of thousands of payphones for the public to use for free, BPP would eliminate private payphones in this country!

Please scrap the idea of BPP, it would be devastating for the operator service industry (the public can already select which carrier to use with either an 800 or 10xxx number), destroy the private payphone industry and eliminate the availability of payphones for the public to use!

I started a private pay phone company in 1985, which has developed into a successful operation that allows me to subcontract to AT&T and the Bell Telephone companies. I have employed several people by way of subcontract work and employees on payroll over the last nine years. I am proud of my achievements and the fact that I have put food on the table for other good, tax-paying individuals. The Billed Party Preference, CC Docket 92-77 will have a negative affect on my business and on the people that work for me.


The issue of how BPP will affect my industry and current income has been virtually ignored and effectively glossed over by the Federal Communications Commission in the guise of serving the "public interest". While I am a consumer advocate, I am also a strong supporter of small business because of the economic value of successful small business in our society today. The consumer is not impacted financially nor given a sub-standard quality of service as our industry works today. When a consumer uses a pay phone in an Airport that belongs to me today, they get the calls rated at Bell Company and AT&T rates, and I might add, their calls are processed through the Bell Company and AT&T. I have commission arrangements with these companies to carry the consumer's call through my equipment. I should be able to choose the carrier that processes calls from my expensive equipment that is serviced by technicians on my payroll. BPP will change the way I have set up my business to be profitable. I cannot imagine that a consumer would expect to get the same good quality service from an equipment provider who is not making a profit!!!
