

(Decided in the December 15, 1992 Open Session)

South Central Bell Telephone Company submitted for filing with the Commission a proposed tariff for the interconnection of local exchange service for Cellular Mobile Carriers. This filing was dated July 12, 1990. This matter was published in the Commission's Official Bulletin for the required 25 days. Several interested parties registered objections to the proposed tariff.

The matter was heard before Hearing Examiner Edward L. Gallegos on September 29, 1992, after numerous continuances at which time the parties entered into a stipulation which was read into the record.

The stipulation was considered by the Commission in its Open Session held October 13, 1992, and allowed the parties to further study the proposed tariff language and to report back to the Commission for final disposition.

The matter was again considered by the Commission in its Open Session held December 15, 1992, at which time the commission accepted the Staff's recommendation and agreement of all parties as to the tariff language. It is therefore

ORDERED that this matter be dismissed and the tariff, as amended, be accepted for filing.







In re: Alleged overcharges for cellular service within the State of Louisiana.

(Decided at the June 29, 1993 Open Session)

In this proceeding the Commission on its own motion cited Pricecellular Corporation, d/b/a Louisiana 8 Corporation (La 8), for alleged overcharges for cellular roaming service within the State of Louisiana.

The matter was tried before Commissioner Irma Muse Dixon and John Schwegmann on April 15, 1993, and taken under advisement.

Witness for La. 8 testified that the charges used by La. 8 are in accordance with the tariff on file with this Commission and presently charge \$3.00 per day and 75¢ per minute to any cellular user that roams on the La. 8 system without a roaming agreement. Evidence was introduced that the Federal Court had ruled on a "Letter of Agreement" between La. 8, Radiofone, Inc., and McCaw, Inc. that called for the transfer of La. 8 to the other parties and the elimination of roaming charges. Also called for the use of 33¢ per minute for calls within the La. 8 territory. The transfer was to occur within 30 days from the date of the Court Order.

Witness for Radiofone, Inc. testified that La. 8 has charged Radiofone customers for bogus calls and asks that the Commission instruct La. 8, or its billing providers, to maintain the "switch tapes" so that Radiofone can credit Radiofone customers for those calls. Radiofone also asks that all billing instructions be provided.

Several citizens appeared and testified that La. 8 had billed them roamer rates while radio units were in use within the City of New Orleans. These calls should have been handled by Radiofone cellular cells.


It is the recommendation of the Staff that:

- 1) The original DAS switch tape records be supplied for analysis.
- 2) All roamer billing instructions given to CellTeck and EDS and any other entity handling the tapes or billing for La. 8 be provided. This includes the original instructions and all iterations relating to billing of roamer calls.
- 3) La. 8 should be instructed not to destroy any other switch tape records in their possession, custody or care, as it may be necessary to look at them after the initial month has been reviewed. This requirement should also apply to billing houses, clearing houses or anyone else handling La. 8 switch tapes.
- 4) La. 8 should be instructed to reduce roaming charges to Radiofone, Inc., Cellular One of Baton Rouge, an Houma-Thibodeaux Cellular Partnership customers to 33¢ per minutes without roaming charges of \$3.00 per day until the final transfer ordered by the Federal Court occurs.


The matter was considered by the Commission at an Open Session held June 29, 1993. The Commission voted to accept the staff recommendation with the proviso that the roaming charges be immediately reduced to 33¢ per minute without roaming charges of \$3.00 per day, until the final transfer ordered by the Federal Court occurs.

It is so ORDERED.



Docket No. U-20349 - In re: Alleged overcharges for cellular service within the State of Louisiana.

Having heard from Louisiana 8 Corporation and Radiofone, Inc., and the Commission being satisfied that entry of this Order is in the public interest because it will facilitate and expedite the transfer of the FCC cellular telephone license covering the Louisiana 8 area (DPCRTS Station KNKN442 - "FCC License") from Louisiana 8 Corporation to Radiofone, Inc. on or before September 15, 1993, the Commission further being satisfied that Louisiana 8 has in fact adjusted its rates and charges to comply with the July 7th order issued by the LPSC; and that Radiofone has credited/reimbursed customers who have complained of being overcharged, and that if any additional customers complain about alleged overcharges by Louisiana 8 within three months of the transfer, Louisiana 8 Corporation shall review the claim and make appropriate reimbursement if any overcharge has been shown (The amount that Radiofone has credited/reimbursed is being worked out between Radiofone and Louisiana 8), some of which matters are represented in the letter of Thomas A. Casey to Commissioner Dixon dated August 13, 1993, which letter is made a part of the record,

IT IS ORDERED:

1. The review and/or hearing of the Request for Rehearing filed by Louisiana 8 Corporation is connected with the July 7, 1993 Order and the same is postponed to the next regular docket of the Commission in September, 1993.
2. In the event Louisiana 8 Corporation and Radiofone, Inc. complete their contemplated transactions and the FCC License is actually transferred to Radiofone, Inc., and they do so on or prior to September 15, 1993, the Commission shall:
 - a. Receive Louisiana 8 Corporation's request to withdraw its request for rehearing and allow the withdrawal;
 - b. Receive Radiofone, Inc.'s request to withdraw its intervention in this proceeding (which request is anticipated only in connection with Louisiana 8 Corporation's withdrawal of its rehearing request) and allow the withdrawal; and
 - c. Terminate this proceeding and any further inquiry into rate and overcharge matters with respect to Louisiana 8.

This Commission notes that Louisiana 8 Corporation and Radiofone, Inc. have agreed to the entry of this Order and have agreed to take the steps referred to in paragraph 2 in the event Louisiana 8 Corporation and Radiofone, Inc. complete their transactions.

3. The July 7, 1993 Order of this Commission remains in full force and effect.



A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

To urge and request the Public Service Commission to establish lower rates for car telephones utilized by handicapped persons.

WHEREAS, many of our handicapped citizens have not been immobilized due to their physical condition; and

WHEREAS, in some instance this mobility is and can be restricted, due to the citizen's fear of encountering problems on the state's highways and roads; and

WHEREAS, access and use of cellular car telephones provides a means of diminishing this fear; and


WHEREAS, the rates charged for the use of such telephones makes such use and access prohibitive for many handicapped citizens; and

WHEREAS, many of our handicapped citizens who have cellular car telephones only utilize them for emergency calls; and

WHEREAS, the establishment of a lower rate of usage for handicapped citizens would greatly increase the opportunity for many of the state's handicapped citizens to utilize such service.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby urge and request the Public Service Commission to establish lower rates for usage of cellular car telephones used by handicapped citizens.



MINUTES OF AUGUST 17 AND 18, 1993 OPEN SESSION OF THE LOUISIANA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION HELD IN BATON ROUGE, LOUISIANA. PRESENT: CHAIRMAN KATHLEEN B. BLANCO, VICE CHAIRMAN JOHN F. SCHWEGMANN, COMMISSIONERS DON OWEN, THOMAS E. POWELL, AND IRMA MUSE DIXON, ALONG WITH SECRETARY MARSHALL B. BRINKLEY

Open Session of August 17, 1993 convened at 9:25 A.M., adjourning at 4:20 P.M. and August 18, 1993 convened at 9:25 A.M., adjourning at 1:30 P.M. in the LPSC Auditorium, 16th Floor, One American Place, Corner of North and Fourth Streets, Baton Rouge, Louisiana with the above-named members of the Commission and Secretary Marshall B. Brinkley present.

T-20411 - Salter Bus Lines, Inc. (Jonesboro, Louisiana), ex parte. In re: Application to amend PSC Tariff No. 13 (Passenger Fares) by increasing fares from seventeen (17) percent to one hundred seven (107) percent for an average sixty-five (65) percent.

On motion of Commissioner Owen, seconded by Commissioner Powell, with Commissioners Blanco and Dixon concurring, and Commissioner Schwegmann absent, the Commission approved the application.

T-20310 - The I-T Security Group, Inc., d/b/a Intertrust (Lafayette, Louisiana), ex parte. In re: Application to amend LPSC Tariff No. 1 (Armored Car Service) by publishing new maximum rates and increasing certain rates, with increases from 10% to 125%, for an average 67.5%.

On motion of Commissioner Owen, seconded by Commissioner Powell, with Commissioners Blanco and Dixon concurring, and Commissioner Schwegmann absent, the Commission approved the application.

T-20235 - Louisiana Public Service Commission vs. Dynasty Transportation, Inc. (Lafayette, Louisiana), ex parte. In re: Alleged violation of Title 45, Chapter 4 of the Revised Statutes of 1950, as amended, and Rules and Regulations of the Commission thereunder, by operating for-hire by motor vehicle beyond the scope of authority granted by the Commission.

Letter to Dynasty

On motion of Commissioner Blanco, seconded by Commissioner Dixon, with Commissioners Owen and Powell concurring, and Commissioner Schwegmann absent, the Company is requested to seek a declaratory order to determine whether its certificate encompasses the type of transportation involved herein; a decision in this docket, T-20235 is deferred pending the results of this declaratory proceeding.

T-20394 - Louisiana Public Service Commission vs. Ray Jarreau (Ventress, Louisiana). In re: Alleged violation of Title 45, Chapter 4 of the Revised Statutes of 1950, as amended, by failing to register with, or notify the Louisiana Public Service Commission of appropriate Interstate Commerce Commission authority for vehicles being operated interstate in Louisiana as required by the Commission's General Order dated September 7, 1972, as amended.

T On motion of Commissioner Dixon, seconded by Commissioner Owen, with Commissioner Blanco concurring, Commissioner Powell dissenting, and Commissioner Schwegmann absent, the Commission found the Company guilty and fined in the amount of \$500.00, and ordered said bond forfeited.

On motion of Commissioner Blanco, seconded by Commissioner Dixon, and unanimously adopted, the Commission approved the application of its Operator Service Provider Guidelines to hotels and motels and the State's colleges and universities. The Commission further ruled that the Guidelines would not apply to jails and correctional facilities with the exception of price caps which it adopted to include time of day rates and separate interLATA and intraLATA benchmark groups. The Commission clarified certain provisions of the Guidelines regarding disconnection of service for non-payment and established a further proceeding to consider the appropriate treatment and handling of "0" calls.

The Commission in its Open Session held August 17, 1993, considered House Concurrent Resolution N. 344 of the 1993 Regular Session. This Resolution urges the Commission to establish lower cellular telephone rates for handicapped person.

The Commission is aware that cellular carriers in Louisiana offer discounted "security" and "safety plan" rates and that these plans allow access to 911 service without charge.

The Staff has been instructed to ask all cellular carriers in Louisiana to publicize these rates and include the free availability of 911 service.

Car phone discounts available for disabled people

SULPHUR — Lower rates may be available for car telephones used by handicapped persons than they may be aware of, according to State Rep. Tim Stine of Sulphur.

Stine and Rep. Charles Riddle, D-Marksville, co-authored a House bill asking the Public Service Commission to establish lower rates for cellular telephones used by handicapped persons.

The PSC conducted an investigation to determine what services were generally available but not widely known to the general public.

As a result, the PSC has asked all cellular carriers operating within the state to make known their presently discounted "security" and "safety plan" rates as well as the access available to cellular subscribers of free 911 services.

On average, the PSC study showed these security rates are in the \$20 per month range with 10 minutes of time incorporated, and 911 is free.

Stine said some handicapped persons may think the cost of using a car telephone is prohibitive. He suggests they contact the nearest carrier for the available safety plan rates.

In Calcasieu Parish, the car-

riers are Mercury Cellular and Lake Cellular Telco. In Jeff Davis, Cameron and Beauregard parishes, carriers are Mercury Cellular and Mobile Teistalk, and in Vernon Parish they are Mercury Cellular and Mid South Cellular.

Stine said he rarely uses his car phone but it gives him a sense of security knowing he can call for assistance in case of car trouble.


FIRST IN U.S.

HOME DELIVERY FROM RETAIL STORE

Daniel H. Holmes began his highly successful retail store operation in 1842 on Chartres Street. Later moved the operation to a larger building on C. Street on the edge of the French Quarter.

Holmes was a successful department store proprietor many years before A.T. Stewart began operating in New York, advertising his store as the first department store in America.

Daniel Holmes was a man ahead of his time. He was the first to hire females to be retail clerks and first to sell ready-to-wear ladies' clothes. One of his popular innovations that spread from coast to coast began in 1845, three years after he went into business. During the Mexican War, many Army officers and their families were stationed in New Orleans. The officers felt as if they were in heaven whenever they stopped in Holmes's department store. The problem was that the road to the barracks was dark and lonely. The ladies, in carrying their purchases back to the barracks, feared robbers. Mr. Holmes, upon learning of this, began a new service to his customers -- free home delivery. This service proved to be so popular it was copied by stores throughout the country.

COLONEL W. W. S. BLISS

Renowned Colonel W. W. S. Bliss (Fort Bliss, Texas, was named in his honor) was a veteran of the Mexican War, and, consequently, a target of many Mexican bullets. Colonel Bliss, however, did not lose his life to a Mexican bullet but to a tiny bite from a mosquito in New Orleans in 1852. Bliss, unfortunately, became one of the statistics in the great yellow fever epidemic of that year and was buried in the city's first Protestant cemetery in New Orleans, the Girod Street Cemetery.

When the city drew plans for the new city hall complex in the 1950's, the Girod Street Cemetery, which had fallen into terrible disrepair, had to be moved to make room for the proposed structure. In 1957 the United States Army sent a team of experts to secure, verify and convey the remains of Colonel W. W. S. Bliss to the fort in Texas named in his honor. Henry Gondolfo, a local expert with unequalled expertise in this field, was chosen to assist the United States Army in its assignment.

The imposing Bliss monument was constructed in gray granite. The column leans from the large base was broken and covered with a shroud, symbolizing death before the expected time.




research, advised the army brass his studies indicated a heavy slate located below the monument served as a protective shield between the monument and the cast iron coffin. When the army dug down four feet, they reached the slate just as Gondolfo had advised. Gondolfo said that on removal of the slate they would find the cast iron coffin in the shape of the human body, like the old Egyptian coffins. He stated that there would be a glass plate over the face area where they would be able to see the face of Colonel Bliss. Records indicated that the body would be without a coat and epaulettes on the shoulders. The space in the coffin was so limited the coat and epaulettes had been removed to close it. Gondolfo then told them the body, before being dressed in uniform, had been wrapped in a light gauze-like material that was to serve as a wick. Before the cast iron coffin was sealed airtight, arsenic had been poured into the heel portion of the coffin. Over a period of time the arsenic had been absorbed by the gauze to moisten the body and aid in its preservation, hopefully for eternity.

Gondolfo said he would stake his reputation on a prediction that the body would be in almost perfect condition in spite of having been sealed for 105 years. Gondolfo then recommended that a transparent plastic cover be made to replace the cast iron cover immediately on its removal, thereby preserving the body. The body could then be shipped to Fort Bliss, Texas, and be put on display for posterity.

When the slate was removed, the cast iron, body-shaped coffin with glass front in the face area was there, just as Gondolfo had said it would be. The glass was cleaned off with a fresh cloth, and the face, with the exception of the tip of the nose where it touched the glass, was just as it had been in 1852.

Unfortunately, a "fly in the ointment" in the military tape. The commanding officer ordered the coffin



ing to his orders, the top was removed (without a plastic replacement being made beforehand). The body was examined to be sure it was the remains of Colonel Bliss.

First, the trousers were cut to check the bones in the legs; next, the teeth were to be taken out and examined. But before all of the checking could be completed, Colonel Bliss protested vehemently by emitting an unbelievable gaseous stench that was so unbearable it drove everyone from the funeral home. As one man said, it was as though a hundred skunks had fumigated the building with all of the windows and doors closed tightly. The body then started to deteriorate rather rapidly, and in a short time it was no longer recognizable. It is unfortunate that army red tape deprived us of seeing a great military leader just the way he looked when he drew his last breath in 1852.

It would be safe to bet that the breaths drawn by those in the funeral home that day would haunt their senses of smell for the balance of their lives.



"Some have predicted we would never reach


