MEMORANDUM OPINION AND ORDER

Issued: November 9, 1994 ; Released: November 14, 1994

AT&T Corp. (AT&T) seeks a ruling on a "Motion to Modify Pretrial Schedule." They filed their motion on November 8, 1994, and want the starting time for the November 10, 1994 prehearing conference and the November 28, 1994 evidentiary admission session moved back from 8:30 a.m. to 9:15 a.m.


One of the complainants, Elehue K. Freemon, and the Enforcement Division of the Common Carrier Bureau do not object to a grant of the relief requested.¹

Ruling

Pursuant to 47 CFR 1.298(a), AT&T's motion will be granted. Granting the relief requested will not unduly interfere with the orderly conduct of this proceeding.

So the "Motion to Modify Pretrial Schedule" that AT&T Corp. filed on November 8, 1994, IS GRANTED; and the starting times for both the November 10, 1994 prehearing conference and the November 28, 1994 evidentiary admission session will be 9:15 a.m.
