ORDER

Issued: June 5, 1995; Released: June 8, 1995


Under consideration are 1) Motion to Expand and Modify the Issues, filed May 9, 1995 by the Wireless Telecommunications Bureau; 2) Opposition to Motion to Expand and Modify the Issues, filed on or about May 12, 1995 by Herbert L. Schoenbohm; and 3) Reply to Opposition, filed on or about May 25, 1995 by the Bureau.

It appears that during amateur radio communications made by him on April 3, 1995, Schoenbohm stated that while he is not permitted to make any requests for "political intervention" in this matter, other people could make such requests on his behalf. He then provided the name, address and telephone number of Congressman Victor Frazer. In this restricted proceeding Schoenbohm's actions may have violated the Commission's rules regarding ex parte presentations. Appropriate issues will be specified.

IT IS ORDERED THAT the Bureau's Motion IS GRANTED and the Issues are Expanded and Modified to read as follows:

- (a) To determine whether, in light of this conviction described in the Hearing Designation Order, Herbert L. Schoenbohm is qualified to renew his amateur service licenses.
- (b) To determine whether Herbert L. Schoenbohm violated Section 1.1210 of the Commission's Rules, 47 C.F.R. §1.1210, by soliciting or encouraging others to make a presentation that he was prohibited from making.
- (c) If it is determined that Herbert L. Schoenbohm did violate Section §1.1210 of the Commission's Rules, 47 C.F.R. §1.1210, to determine the effect of such a violation on his qualifications to renew his amateur service licenses.
- (d) To determine, in light of the foregoing issues, whether granting Herbert L. Schoenbohm's application would serve the public interest, convenience and necessity.
