

on health, consumer goods, finances, etc.), news, music, video fiction and short stories, comedy, and other programming that is not sexually explicit, much less obscene. On other occasions, Playboy television provides special programming such as its recent December 1, 1995 four-hour programming on AIDS awareness and safe sexual practices done in connection with World AIDS Day, created by the World Health Organization in 1988. The programming on AdultTVision is almost exclusively long form and video films, some of which, in more sexually explicit detail than the cable versions, are sold by the producers and/or copyright holders through home video retailers.

10. Playboy also produces and/or licenses, on an exclusive or non-exclusive basis, certain of its programming to other major premium network providers such as Showtime/The Movie Channel and HBO/Cinemax, who in turn show such programming on their own networks. On many occasions, the same programming will be shown by both Playboy Television and other non-adult oriented premium or pay-per-view networks such as Showtime/The Movie Channel, HBO/Cinemax, Viewer's Choice/Hot Choice or Action Pay-Per-View.

11. For example, a series entitled "Inside Out" was developed for Playboy Television and consisted of 26 half-hour programs. Subsequent to the showing of that series on Playboy Television, Viewer's Choice acquired the license and is showing "Inside Out" on its own network. Another series entitled "Passion Alley," also known as "Love Street," was a seven-part 60 minute series made for both Playboy Television and Showtime/The Movie Channel. Under the

arrangement, Playboy Television showed the series first and currently it is being shown on Showtime/The Movie Channel. Another series tentatively entitled "Women" consists of 13 half-hour programs which, under an existing licensing agreement, will air first on Showtime/The Movie Channel and then on Playboy Television. "Other Peoples Secrets," originally shown on Playboy Television, is now licensed to Action Pay-Per-View. A program entitled "Married People: Single Sex Part II" was originally licensed by and shown on Playboy Television. That program is now airing on Action Pay-Per-View.

12. With the exception of the series "Women" which is now in production, all of the above programs previously shown on Playboy Television currently are being shown the week of February 10 -16 on premium or pay-per-view networks, most, if not all, of which are unlikely to be deemed sexually oriented networks within the scope of Section 505.

13. Other cable networks which are not primarily dedicated to sexually explicit adult programming show other programming that is at least as sexually explicit as the material on the Playboy networks. Further, the Playboy networks programming contains far less violence than many network broadcast television dramas.

14. Playboy uses standards and guidelines in determining what programming will be suitable for the Playboy network which are designed to eliminate any material that would be deemed patently offensive. It has a team of

four in-house lawyers who view all programming to assure that it is neither obscene nor violative of general community standards.

15. Indeed, no court or administrative agency in any jurisdiction has ever found the Playboy networks or any of their programming to be obscene or harmful to minors. Similarly, in its more than forty years in publication, not one issue of Playboy magazine has ever been found obscene or harmful to minors by any judicial or administrative system, state or federal. The United States Attorney General's Commission on Pornography concluded that Playboy magazine "is plainly non-offensive" and Dr. Park Elliot Dietz, the psychiatrist and member of the Attorney General's Commission on Pornography, has publicly stated that Playboy Magazine contains the "healthiest sexual images in America."

16. The chilling impact of Section 505 is already being felt. On February 16, 1996, Playboy received a letter from Mr. James Fellhauer, President of Time Warner Cable, stating: "In compliance with the recent signing of the Telecommunications bill regarding adult programming, we have instructed all Time Warner Cable's San Diego Division systems to reduce carriage of adult programming to 10:00 p.m.-6:00 a.m. This reduction in carriage will remain in effect unless an amendment to the bill is passed." Further, Mr. Fellhauer stated: "Please be aware that this action to reduce the carriage of adult programming will cause a financial burden on each of the systems within our division." See Attachment 1 hereto.

17. Time Warner Cable is one of the largest cable operators carrying Playboy television and the failure of all systems within Time Warner Cable San Diego Division to carry Playboy television from 6:00 a.m. through 10:00 p.m. will have a serious impact not only on Time Warner Cable but on Playboy and its individual subscribers as well.

18. A survey of cable programming for the week of February 10 through February 16, 1996 for numerous premium channels including HBO/Cinemax, Showtime/The Movie Channel, Action Pay-Per-View, and Hot Choice, among others, was prepared under my direction. The purpose of this survey was to determine the amount of "objectionable" programming shown on other premium networks, including non-adult-oriented networks. For purposes of this survey, the term "objectionable" refers to those programs which parents might not want their young children to view due to its content based on codes provided by the program provider or another neutral third party such as T.V. Guide. Such codes include, inter alia, viewers' discretion advised, objectionable language, nudity, sexual language or sexual situations. The ratings for each such program were obtained from the February 10-16, 1996 T.V. Guide or the February television schedules provided by the individual network such as Viewer's Choice and Action Pay-Per-View. For films that were not rated in any of these sources, the ratings used in this survey were those issued by the Motion Picture Association of America or contained on the commercial movie video jacket of each such film.

19. The results of this survey are set forth in Attachment 2. The survey results show that during the week of February 10-16, 1996, HBO showed a total of 116 programs, of which 57 (approximately 50%) were rated as containing "objectionable" material. Out of a total 86.5 hours of programming provided by HBO that week, an average of 12.4 hours of programming each day contained "objectionable" material. Similarly, of the 109 programs shown on Showtime the week of February 10-16, 52 programs (approximately 47%) contained "objectionable" material. For some networks such as Viewer's Choice, every program shown that week contained "objectionable" material.


20. On February 9, 1995, the National Cable Television Association ("NCTA") adopted guidelines for the transmission of "primarily sexually-oriented premium channels." These guidelines provide for the type of blocking on demand that were adopted in Section 504 of the Telecommunications Act of 1996. See Attachment 3 hereto. They also contain more extensive voluntary efforts to provide for customer choice. Playboy is a member of the National Cable Television Association and strongly supports these guidelines.

Dear Mr. McKinney:

My purpose in writing is to object to the offensive content of talk shows regular TV programming such as Geraldo, Hour Magazine, Donahue and Oprah Winfrey. These programs are constantly barraging the airwaves with sexually explicit material and are on daily at times when impressionable children are home. This is our general complaint.

Our complaint in particular is one show aired on October 29 having to do with telephone sex. It seems that two women interviewed on Geraldo had their "Dial-a-porn" business complete with a corporate name which does a good charge card business. The stated purpose, according to Mr. Geraldo, is male orgasm after talking with these women. This show airs at 9 a.m. here in Evansville. Additionally, the exposure on the Geraldo Show was free advertising for them. If children didn't know about it before, they sure do now.

Our organization has gone to the trouble of monitoring this show, and the result is the enclosed video tape of the October 29 Geraldo show. We believe this show is the most blatantly offensive and is clearly in violation of FCC guidelines.

Between October 26 and November 6, Geraldo has featured witches casting spells, (witchcraft and Satan worship is on the increase in this country), women presenting their business of giving sexual fantasy and pleasure by phone, men discussing what they want sexually from women in bed, male and female strippers including an 80 year old woman, and male female impersonators. This type of sensationalism is repeated in the other shows mentioned. It's safe to say that on any given day, most of these shows, if not all, will be airing some sexually troubling content.

There is documented proof of harm done re the telephone sex business as reported on Hour Magazine on Nov. 16. It seems a 12 yr. old boy who, along with others, was caught making calls to Dial-a-porn from their church office. The 12 yr. old then sodomized a 4-yr. old girl as a direct result of what he learned on these calls! Again, according to Hour Magazine on that date, Pacific Bell Telephone reported that \$27,000,000 was spent in their area on such calls this year. Their expert estimated that hundreds of millions of dollars are spent on these calls nationwide.

Please advise us what your office will do to stop this destructive influence on American society.



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

So he might make love to her the way he made love to his ex-girlfriend or his ex-wife or what she liked and the second woman could just hate everything that he's doing. And he says, "What am I doing wrong? I'm following the instructions that number one gave me, but number two doesn't like it." See, that's psychic sex, not asking for what you want, not talking about it.

GERALDO: What about— is it a myth and the most common problem in sexual problem in sexual relationships is that the— many women are non-orgasmic?

Dr. DE ANGELIS: Yes, they're not orgasmic, but they're non-orgasmic for reasons that haven't been talked about a lot. I have found in my work that probably 60 to 70 percent of the women who say, "I am not orgasmic with my partner" — they may be by themselves but not with their partner — it is an emotional problem not a physiological one. Surrendering and having an orgasm is being very vulnerable. It means you have to feel very safe and if you have, again, hidden resentments, if you feel controlled by your husband, if you feel angry, the greatest way to get even is to just hold back, unconsciously, and not give that release. And I have worked with women who haven't been orgasmic for 15 years, they clear out all that emotional stuff and bang, the next time, for the first time in their life. So a lot of times, women who feel that they're just non-orgasmic and of course the man has to do the right things, too. There's a fear of letting go.

GERALDO: Okay. Is it a myth that men think an erection is enough? That he's done his job if he comes to the party ready?

Mrs. MUIR: Yes, that is a myth. We have asked many women in our seminars in Hawaii if the most important thing in their lovemaking is their man's erection. We have yet to have a woman raise her hand. That is not the important thing in lovemaking, men. It's the intimacy. It's how much you're there with us. That's what turns us on.

GERALDO: You know, I've heard that before, and I know that—

Dr. DE ANGELIS: It's very hard for men to believe that.

GERALDO: —but intimacy without an erection would be a frustrating dilemma as well, would it not?

Mr. MUIR: Well, passion without an erection is what might be frustrating but intimacy can still be there and it's not how big your penis, it's how well you use it, how much energy you put out of it, how much heart energy you put out through that penis. That's what's important to a woman. And how—

GERALDO: I've heard that said in a slightly coarser way but I'm not— I'm going to take a break, Charles, then we'll be right back. We'll be back clearing up more myths, tantra techniques. Real techniques after this.

[Commercial break]

GERALDO: Okay, we're back. Barbara, the title of the book *How to Make Love All the Time*, is it a myth that the role of the man should be aggressive, the woman passive? Is there a myth of the angry penis?

Dr. DE ANGELIS: Yes. The angry penis, I'm sure you're all dying to know what that is and—

GERALDO: It was a horror movie, wasn't it?

Dr. DE ANGELIS: The invasion of the— no.

GERALDO: Let's not laugh or we won't be able to get this show on.

Dr. DE ANGELIS: Sometimes— and we mentioned on this a little bit earlier, when a woman's made love to, she is taking up the energy that a man comes to the relationship with and comes to bed with, not just what he's doing physically but how he's feeling, the emotions he carries in. Whether he's having sex or not, if he has anger inside of him, if he has things he's been upset with her about that he hasn't talked about, if he's frustrated, if he doesn't feel appreciated by her, well she's going to feel when his penis is there in front her — and this is going to sound strange — it's going to look angry to her. And I bet some of you ladies are nodding their heads, they know what I'm talking about. It doesn't feel like you're being made to love, it feels like someone's having sex with you and it's not the same as being made love to. So there's a sense of somebody trying to release the energy, trying to ejaculate, as opposed to something that's bringing adoration, bringing a sense of unity. And women are very sensitive to this. Sometimes they

don't know what to say and so they just say, "I'm not in the mood, honey." But that's not really it. They are in the mood to make love, they're not in the mood to have sex, just sex.

Mr. MUIR: It's almost as if the man is masturbating inside the woman.

Dr. DE ANGELIS: Women hate that!

Mrs. MUIR: Women hate that.

GERALDO: What exactly is— I know tantra is yoga, but what is tantra sex?

Mrs. MUIR: Tantric sex is the— is the—

GERALDO: Is it tantra or tantric? Which is it?

Mrs. MUIR: Tantra or—

Mr. MUIR: Tantra's the study, tantric—

Mrs. MUIR: Tantra is the fusion of the passion and intimacy. That's the connection that we're trying to make in our teaching, in our relating.

GERALDO: But is it a physical technique? I mean, is it like pushups to build up your biceps? I mean, is there an exercise you can do to make you a better lover?

Mrs. MUIR: It's an art form of how to make you a better lover, how to help you become a better lover. Because there was no school we could go to. We've had our limited experience, we maybe turned to a porn film which is nothing about love. So yes, there are techniques that could make you a better lover, learning how to touch more fully, learning the exotic ways of kissing, learning the exotic techniques that have been handed down for 3,000 years from India, little tricks that we could all benefit from.

Dr. DE ANGELIS: But, of course, it has to start outside the bedroom. See, for the last 20 years, we have seen such a slew of sex books — you know, "Your G-spot," "How to have triple orgasms" — and the sexual revolution, as we know right now, is kind of in a wane. People are frustrated with that. You don't see a lot of these books anymore because it has to start before you get into bed. One of the biggest myths, Geraldo, is that either we go all the way or we do nothing. I call this the "all or nothing syndrome," and I know you've all experienced this. You wake up in the morning with your husband or whoever it is and you start to kiss a little bit and you're feeling intimate and you're in a hurry to go to work and the man says — usually it's the man — "No, no, I want to stop here. We don't have time to do anything," right? And what does he mean by do anything? He means, "We don't have time to take off our clothes, do foreplay, have intercourse, have orgasms, take a shower and go to work." So we do nothing. He says, "Don't get me excited." He just missed an opportunity to make love, not all the way, not completely, but to share a moment of passion and a moment of closeness. When you share ten of those moments during a week, Saturday night comes, you're going to be in the mood to make love with this person, right? 'Cause you've been making love all week long. But if you haven't touched each other all week, not even kissed, all of a sudden, Saturday night, okay, it's our Saturday night time to do it, right? You're not in the mood, ladies. You're not in the mood.

GERALDO: Wait, wait, I got a little dispute here in the front row. Wait, wait, what do you say?

3rd AUDIENCE MEMBER: You got a whole lot of negative stuff about mens. I mean, what about the womens? The situation is when you— when a man want to make love, they go and say, "I'm tired," you understand? So now, why is all of this—

Mr. MUIR: Angry vaginas.

GERALDO: Is there any talking about what happened in your house last Saturday night or—

Dr. DE ANGELIS: You see, she was— she was nodding her head.

3rd AUDIENCE MEMBER: We don't do it that way.

GERALDO: Oh, no?

3rd AUDIENCE MEMBER: We— we makes love real nice. But I mean, they used to come up and say, "Well, I'm tired," and the man is ready, so— this is negative, a whole negative talk about mens.

Mrs. MUIR: I'd like to say something about that.

GERALDO: Go ahead.

Mrs. MUIR: Women today are starting to get excited about their sexuality and nice girls do that and they enjoy it and they like it.

GERALDO: You talk about the tantra sex techniques. I really want this to be a— you know, a mechanical show, not a juicy, a mechanical show, that you do this or you do that, whatever.

Mr. MUIR: We talked about the penis earlier on and of its importance or not importance. It's im-

portant—

GERALDO: I think it'd be fairly central to any discussion about good sex.

Mr. MUIR: Well, it's important that a man learn to use that penis the way an artist uses a— a master artist uses a paintbrush, with style, with varied techniques, with texture and totally connected to it. There's more to doing this than *[slaps hands together]*. And if a man is willing to learn those techniques and if a woman is also willing to learn how to move her vagina and channel love out of it, then you're going to have two people coming together, not really afraid to connect in this way, not afraid of failure and not afraid of frustrating one another.

GERALDO: I've heard about— you know, that seems obvious to me but what about this PC muscle? Is this some part of your body that's not developed, evolved in many people? I mean, what is it?

Mr. MUIR: It's a muscle that atrophies very early on in life 'cause it gets no exercise. It's one of the major muscles—

GERALDO: What does it do?

Mrs. MUIR: —of orgasm. It's a muscle in a man, for instance, if he has a strong muscle, he can make love much longer before the need to ejaculate comes on. It's a muscle that, when well-toned, will give a firmer erection like we all remember it when we were 16 or 18. It's something, when atrophied, it's going to cause problems with firmness and with premature ejaculation.

GERALDO: Is there a way — talking about men now — to, once you're past 18, bring back the PC muscle to its prime?

Mrs. MUIR: Of course, there are a dozen different exercises.

GERALDO: Okay, you can tell us some of them after this break. We'll be right back.

Mrs. MUIR: Right.

*[Commercial break]*

GERALDO: Unraveling the mysteries of great sex our focus. What does PC stand for?

Mr. MUIR: It's short for pubococcygeus [?] muscle. It's the muscle that connects the tailbone with the pubic bone.

GERALDO: All right, let's see a graphic of that. I want to see the picture. Okay. So it there— it's literally a muscle in there?

Mr. MUIR: Literally a muscle, runs right through the base of the penis.

GERALDO: All right, this is in men. What about in women?

Mr. MUIR: It runs right through the vagina as well. And it's that major muscle that contracts when the woman orgasms.

GERALDO: And the same for the guy?

Mr. MUIR: And the same for the guy. The more toned it is, the more powerful the orgasm.

GERALDO: Okay, so how do you tone this particular muscle?

Mr. MUIR: Well, there are a variety of exercises that tantra teaches. The most familiar ones for beginners are a contraction and relaxation exercise. It's important for the people to first discover what muscle are we talking about.

GERALDO: How do you do that, though?

Mr. MUIR: Well, the next time you would go to the bathroom to urinate and start urinating, stop the flow by squeezing the muscles and while the flow is stopped, relax your anus and the muscle that's still squeezing and stopping the flow is the PC muscle. Relax the muscle, the urine'll start flowing again. So once you know, "Oh, that's the muscle," now I can begin to play with it. I can squeeze it, I can tighten it, relax it, tighten, relax. And when a man does that, when a man squeezes, relaxes, squeezes, relax, it's bouncing up and down inside the woman's vagina in a wonderful way, touching up against one of her most sensitive parts of the vagina, what's called the sacred spot in tantra or the G-spot, as western sexology is starting to discover it.

Dr. DE ANGELIS: It's kind of like sexual weightlifting.

Mrs. MUIR: Exactly. Exactly. Women will find in the beginning — men and women — it's like a weak muscle. If you go to the gym and you haven't been working out, it's hard to get those weights up there. When you first start practicing the PC muscle, you want to tighten up on it and you want to hold it, hold it, tight, tight, tight, tight, tight and let go. The letting go and relaxing of it is just as important as the tightening.

Mr. MUIR: And when a woman has this down pat and she's toned the muscle, she no longer worries about his erection disappearing, she just sort of squeezes him and pumps him back up.

with their PC muscle. And yet, these are the people having a lot of problems in their sex life right now after 15, 20 years of marriage. The answer is not an affair. The answer is to clean up the emotional relationship and they work together to be a loving couple.

GERALDO: Do you two talk about, you know, these techniques and things?

4th AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yeah.

GERALDO: How do you bring it up. I mean— I mean, what— I don't care about the intimate details, I mean just how do you do it?

6th AUDIENCE MEMBER: Well, sometimes it depends. You know, she might say that, you know, "I would like to have sex," or you know, just a little of foreplay, you know. It varies.

GERALDO: So would you be so bold as to say, "Do this or don't do that?"

7th AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes, I would but I like what the gentleman said, something about when you practice with this muscle, you can do it more often? 'Cause I sometimes wonder because there's a little age difference between us and I like the idea of, you know, doing it more often.

Mrs. MUIR: Practice your PC muscle.

GERALDO: So, get the exercise, you got the other— you can write in for a transcript of this program. We'll be right back.

GERALDO: Unraveling the mysteries of great sex our focus. What's your question?

8th AUDIENCE MEMBER: Charles, how long have you been using your PC muscle and how long did it take you to achieve orgasm?

Mr. MUIR: I've been exercising my PC muscle about six years consciously and I ejaculate and orgasm when I want to. With good control of PC muscles, a man can separate orgasm from ejaculation and have more than one orgasm.

GERALDO: Wait, wait, wait.

Mr. MUIR: Aha! New information.

GERALDO: Isn't ejaculation synonymous with or at least the main event of an orgasm?

Mr. MUIR: Well, they all come together when they come, but with practice, they can be separated. I define an orgasm of— as an experience of the energy and an ejaculation as the release of this energy. It's waves of energy. It's like surfing. You can go right up to the point where most people get wiped out by the wave and cut out of the wave before it wipes you out.

Dr. DE ANGELIS: And the same thing can happen for women. And this is why some women can have multiple orgasms and some can't, which is letting the energy build up but not that feeling when you know, ladies, sometimes when you have an orgasm, you don't want to be touched after that. You don't want to go on, right? And it's just uncomfortable. That's because women also have a form of ejaculation. In fact, there's even some fluid that's excreted. So women can also have multiple orgasms without releasing the energy that makes you want to keep uniting with your partner.

GERALDO: Okay, we've talked about how to tone the PC muscle. Now, there are some other exercise techniques or things to do with your partner and, again—

Mrs. MUIR: To share the—

GERALDO: —I want to— let me just state again for the record, that we're not talking about promiscuous or irresponsible conduct. This is Dr. De Angelis, Barbara mentioned for people together 15, 20 years, married couples, you know, people who this is for the enhancement of that, you know, that solid, traditional kind of relationship.

Dr. DE ANGELIS: I— by the way, just a disclaimer. I believe that sex and love only work in a monogamous relationship and I don't think that non-monogamous relationships for most people ever work.

GERALDO: Okay, we take the monogamous relationship. Let's say our two models or volunteers have been together for a while. Charles, what exercise can they do?

Mr. MUIR: This is Gloria and Robert, they're students of mine.

GERALDO: Hi, Gloria and Robert.

Mr. MUIR: They came to Hawaii—

GERALDO: Pretend we're not here. It's okay.

Mr. MUIR: They came to Hawaii to take our seminar. They hadn't really had any exposure to tantra. They'd been together for 12 years.
