Alternative to incinerator

For the \$215 million the proposed Mercer County incinerator is supposed to cost, we can get rid of our county garbage without it at the present, already over the top \$117 per ton rates for the next 18 to 20 years.

Add the \$215 million construction cost of the burner to the scheduled tipping fees proposed for it, and getting rid of 20 years worth of garbage will cost us \$325 million, or five million dollars more per year than it costs us now.

And that's an optimistic estimate. Since those wonderful folks in Mercer County government already bring us the costliest county library system in the state, proof provided upon request, you can be sure they won't rest until they charge us more for solid waste garbage disposal than anybody else

who lives in New Jersey's other 20 counties will have to pay.

Freeholder Michael Angarone's Aug. 4 letter gives the impression that he views the incinerator as a political issue. As a taxpayer — and who of us is not? — I view it at an economic issue. As such, it's a malodorous deal for everyone involved, including those who live in the county and who work for contractors who expect to work on the burner's construction.

Whatever few bucks they make on their temporary gig will quickly be eaten up by higher county taxes. The sharks of both parties who infest the waters at 640 South Broad St. will make sure of that.

The incineration process works differently.

First, with the incinerator, Mercer County will continue to recycle.

Second, material that is not recycled will be disposed of in the resource recovery plant. In this process everything is reduced to ash. The ash is a sooty soil-type substance.

We must continue to move ahead. We can no longer continue to use our valuable land resources as dumping grounds. We need an efficient alternative method of disposing of our garbage and the answer is the resource recovery plant.

Not only will this alternative method of disposal save our land resources, but it is also more economical since hauling and dumping fees would be eliminated.

Needless to say, Marilyn Jose and the Mercer County Democratic Party's beliefs are not representative of the majority of the taxpayers of Mercer County. I submit that there was never any indication from representatives of TKR that our local news and information station would be affected. Councilman Lacy is entirely correct when he states that a survey of Hamilton residents revealed their desire for more local programming, not

ensure that employers reasonably accommodate their employees' religious practices. Passage of this bill would be a milestone in the protection of religious liberty. It is supported by a wide range of religious and civil liberties groups. Congress should act swiftly to enact this bill into law.

For many religiously observant Americans, the greatest peril to their ability to carry out their religious faiths on a day-to-day basis may come from their employers — employers who will not make reasonable accommodation for observance of the Sabbath and other holy days or employers who refuse to allow employees to wear garb required by their religion, such as a yarmulke, a turban or other clothing that meets modesty requirements.

The refusal of an employer, absent undue hardship on the workplace or in the performance of duties, to provide such reasonable accommodation of religious practice is a form of religious discrimination. Religious discrimination should be treated as seriously as any other form of discrimination that stands between Americans and equal employment opportunities. The proposed legislation draws an appropriate balance between the legitimate interests of an employer and the right of an employee to practice his or her religion.

It is time to enact the Workplace Religious Freedom Act into law.

The Robin Hood report is the most convincing when it comes to the societal costs of childbearing — not because the costs are trivial but because they are necessarily nebulous. For the added costs imposed by childbearing on health care, foster care and prison costs must largely be guessed. The cost to taxpayers of lost wages on the part of the young parent is also largely a guess.

The total of such costs is \$1.3 billion a year for increased health care, \$900,000 for increased foster care placements, and for higher prison costs that would disappear if mothers waited until 20 or 25 to have their first child.

ONE MORE useful byproduct of the teen pregnancy epidemic is the tendency of such social scientists to think of "the problem" — principally African Americans and Hispanics — as a source of the problem. A that the teen birth rate for two groups are very high per 1,000 females aged 15 to 19.
