
The Land Mobile Service has proposed the above-referenced change in the current band allocation for 420-430 MHz and 440-450 MHz bands.



I am writing this letter as a licensed Radio Amateur who is interested in maintaining one of the very important means of communication in case of natural and unnatural disasters which can and do occur with too great a frequency. That is the retaining of the frequency spectrum as a government entity. Too many small bits of that spectrum have been whittled away already and assigned to the commercial interests.

If this trend is not halted, we will lose a very valuable security resource which can never be recovered for future use by the government in time of need such as a war or other serious emergency.

Therefore I urge with all my energy that further access to the 70 centimeter band be denied to the Land Mobile Communications Council as outlined in RM 9267. The 70 centimeter band is used extensively by the radio amateur community in my area. We have a Skywarn network in place for spotting of tornados and other severe weather events. With reference to RM9267 ,I submit the following comments.

I as owner/operator of Amateur Radio station W6KHX.strenously object for the following reasons:

1. The Land Mobile Commission Council should not have any power to demand that The FCC re-allocate frequencies, especially since those frequencies are already allocated for Amateur Radio Use. They might have more money , though.

2.The 70 cm bands are extensively used in the Radio Amateur Service. This band is the second most popular and used band in the Amateur VHF/UHF allocation. Along with the 2 meter band it provides the core of emergency and other public service communication effort in local communities throughout the entire U.S.

3.These frequencies are also extensively used by hams in voice,data,mobile,fixed and even television operations. In addition, satellite and extended range earth operations are conducted. Many of these operations require sensitive receivers and high levels of effective radiated power.Almost every Hertz of the 420-430 and 440-450 Mhz bands are in daily use by "hams".

4. RM9267 would require secondary use by ther Amateur service and would obviously kill Amateur Radio in that part of the radio spectrum..Additionally another band, the 222-225 Mhz band would also be impacted because of the extensive use of 420-450 Mhz signals in the linking/control of repeaters in the 222 Mhz band. The other bands suggested in RM9627 are also in use by the Amateur Service.

5. I believe that invading Amateur bands is contrary to the public interest . Furthermore the sale of radio frequencies to the highest bidder is foreign to the precepts established long ago by Congressional actions.
