Privacy may become a problem if legislation regarding net neutrality is passed. It seems irrational to trust the same people who have already been caught spying on United States citizens. With the passing of legislation would come heavy monitoring by the government. The FCC would need to constantly monitor telecoms and any business that relies on the internet to function. In order to make sure that telecoms are following the regulations put in place, they would need to have their data checked on a routine basis. Companies on the internet would also need to verify that they are not being charged differently than other companies. Joshua Steimle, a writer for Forbes, said "The government will need to verify, at a technical level, whether the telecoms are treating data as they should. Don't be surprised if that means the government says it needs to be able to install its own hardware and software at critical points to monitor Internet traffic." This assumption that the government would want to install their own hardware is not that farfetched. If this were to occur the FCC would have a great deal more control of what is put on the internet. In effect allowing for the government to make net neutrality laws would very likely lead to greater censorship of the internet.
