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I would like the commissioners to imagine Thomas Jefferson looking over their shoulders. What would this great Enlightenment figure and Founding Father think of the idea of allowing access to the internet-printing presses in his day-to be effectively under the control of moneyed interests? Our contemporary technology makes overwhelming suffocating control possible in ways that were inconceivable in 1787. That makes standing by the principle, in this case making sure we have net neutrality, many times more important than it was when our nation was founded. And it was, according to Mr. Jefferson, the most important thing then for preserving liberty. I can only say, "Even more so now."
