I am writing to you as a small business whose company provides fixed wireless broadband service in Randolph County Indiana. While we support an Open Internet, we are concerned that the FCC may adopt rules that would increase regulatory burdens on small businesses like ours, forcing an increase in price to consumers. I believe that the FCC should defer any action in its Open Internet proceeding and afford Congress the opportunity to adopt legislation that appropriately considers the impact of new Open Internet obligations on small businesses.

PCS-WIN (www.pcswin.com) is a WISP (Wireless Internet Service Provider) in eastern Indiana. We serve High-Speed internet to 850 homes and businesses and are always looking for growth opportunities. Funding is very scarce for our small business so we are constantly reinvesting our own money to expand services to new areas without any government funds. As a small business, overburdening government control and oversight would seriously reduce the services we can add to our customers, many who have no other option then our services. We already comply with FCC form 477 filings and the Open Internet rules that were adopted in 2010.

We utilize the unlicensed bands to be as cost effective as possible and provide as much bandwidth as affordable to our customer base. We do not receive USF funds but cover areas that those who receive those funds refuse to build to.

As stated earlier I support an open internet in which lawful content is not blocked and our company would never receive payment for prioritizing traffic. I am also concerned as to why these discussions are happening but Disney's services like ESPN360 have not been dealt with. Having 850 Clients I am not allowed to offer ESPN360 to the 20 clients that have requested it without paying for the service for all 850 clients. There for I have been require due to financial issues and the cost that would need to increase for all my subscribers to not offer that service. This is not open internet, it is forcing service on the masses.

The FCC needs to consider that a tremendous amount of Rural America is serviced by small internet providers who cannot handle the heavy handed regulations that Title II would impose on them. Small business should be exempt from all Title II regulations. Give Congress (elected officials) the time to come up with a better plan.
