

## Reply to Statement of Commissioner Jessica Rosenworcel

Re: *Protecting and Promoting the Open Internet*, GN Docket No. 14-28-332260A4

Many U.S. citizens and Commissioner Rosenworcel believe America's "porn-addicted" economy is the envy of the world and allege America invented "online" and the applications economy. These allegations are offensive, presumptuous, and absurd to many. The broadband wires below us and on public radio airwaves around us today have broadcast illegal "*obscene, indecent, or profane*" material to our homes, schools, and businesses in communities across the country to encourage pornographic entrepreneurship and experimentation for the last eighteen-plus years since wholly anonymous indulgences in illegal communications were allowed. This makes America's "*online*" harm the moral culture of the entire Earth since wires carried our indecency world-wide when allowed to enter. Sustaining what has made America Earth's most addicted nation to "*online*" pornography should not be allowed to continue. Our grandparents gave us the FCC to regulate both wires and radio used for interstate and worldwide communications to protect us from exactly what we are collectively addicted to. Our generation failed to follow clear laws written to make these interstate and worldwide communications safe. This was the very obligation the FCC was given in 1934 when created. This should soon begin after two decades of allowing wholly anonymous indulgences in "obscene, indecent or profane" broadcasts like Rev Martin Luther protested against in October 31, 1517.

The FCC has a duty—a duty to protect children from what made "online" the most dynamic platform for free pornography ever invented. "Online" can be our printing press, town square, and individual soapbox **without** broadcasting pornography by wire and radio to our unauthenticated District Court judges and our children.

America cannot have a multi-tiered "online" with fast lanes speeding HD pornography to the privileged and leaving the rest of us barely able to watch "*Deep Throat*" to soothe or addicted adult desires. We cannot have gatekeepers tell us what we can and cannot do and where we can and cannot go online **as adults**. We do not need blocking, throttling, and paid prioritization schemes that undermine "online" porn haven as we know it.

The new FCC rules use our existing statutes, including Title II authority, to put back in place basic safe, fair, open "online" policies that courts removed first in 1997 and again last year. The result honors the creative, collaborative, and open "online" envisioned initially by Curtis J Neeley Jr before placing material "online" became broadcasting. Sir Tim Berners-Lee, the creator of the World Wide Web was NOT AN American and built the "online" used in America for almost twenty years to lower the sexual morals of society.

Four million Americans wrote the FCC to make known their ideas, thoughts, and deeply-held opinions about "online". Phone lines do not glow but citizens clogged our e-mail in-boxes and filled our "online" comment system. Curtis J. Neeley Jr. filed a lawsuit in the Western District of Arkansas that continues now on appeal at the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals. United States Courts are not likely to admit their addictions there to the free pornography made specifically by U.S. Courts telling American parents viewing broadcasts of pornography was a new human right. *Reno v ACLU* in 1997 alleged wire and radio communications uniting to be a "unique and [holy] new medium for world-wide human communications" of illegal pornographic material when broadcast by ONLY analog radio instead of wire and digital radio can be seen at the following URLs.
