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In the interest of fairness, multiple providers to any service should be offered in an area not only to generate competition in price but also in service. The internet is a widely used utility that is slowly becoming properly regulated and I'd like to see that pattern continue by enforcing anti-trust/anti-monopoly acts nationwide.

My current residence has access to only ISP and only one available package. It is currently still being advertised as "broadband" although the FCC ruling in January changed the minimum requirements of broadband to well above what is even offered in these packages (6 and 12 Mbps respectively, and I can't even get the speeds for the 12 Mbps package out here). For reference, Frontier also distributes internet to the university not even two miles from my apartment and I believe has a facility right off of campus [I intended to fact check this statement and have been trying to load a NCUC pdf that would tell me, but it still has yet to load].

This is a beautiful opportunity for the FCC to put its foot down and begin regulating ISPs like a public utility. I'd like to see Chairman Wheeler and the FCC put action to their words and rule in favor of the people instead of the corporations.
