Dear Ms. Dortch,

How dare a Coast Guard looking plane fly over my residence yesterday so low that the place rumbled, not once, not twice, but four times in quick succession, including circling to fly over the nearby library where I have been actively accessing the Internet?

Perhaps the FCC doesn't understand that what I have continued to present are not fairy tales. The following was zoomed from the photo on the next page.



All of the photos of the large plane were taken by me where I live as the sun was setting on April 26, 2016. The photo below looks like the plane is at higher altitude, but it was flying so fast I didn't get another object in the photo to show perspective. This plane looked exactly like the one mentioned on pages 13 and 14 of my January 19, 2016 Additional Reply to Responses/Oppositions, when at one point it flew directly over my previous residence at 1:30 a.m.



The same plane is pictured below, which flew so fast the camera didn't have time to focus.



The following was taken after the plane made hard turns and flew over the library about four blocks away.



As a neighbor and I stood in the street waiting for the plane to return again, it flew perhaps 1000-1500 feet in altitude so quickly that it was hard for me to take a photo as it flew directly over my residence. The four flyovers from the same direction and altitude, with the same circling to fly over the nearby library, spanned perhaps 30-45 minutes at sunset. This plane was exceptionally low.



Today in the mail on the front page of the *Neighborhood Weekly* by the Modesto Bee was a photo of the twin-wing plane that I mentioned to the FCC in my previous letter. The article stated that the plane flew over Turlock on April 17 bringing older veterans on free flights, and the photo showed a black wheel at the back.

Although it's possible that I was incorrect about that plane being used to follow me, it's very likely given where I went and how that plane followed, as well as how it specifically circled my sister's house extremely low shortly after I arrived. Nonetheless, it was only one plane on one day across six months of other planes.

This afternoon my mom and I were driving downtown and she noticed a friend walking, so she parked, got out and starting talking. About five to ten minutes later as I sat in the car I heard a plane approach. The following is what I saw. This photo was taken in downtown Turlock with the nearest airport about ten miles away. This is only one of several today.



My mom and I went to my sister's house and I continued typing this letter. What happened? Of course, the familiar twin-engine plane (not pictured above) flew over at high speed. It's the one plane that's been hardest to photograph.

You may wonder what prompts the flyovers. One guess is to gain firsthand knowledge if I am being contacted by someone in the local, state or federal government, media or any other type of representative. Another guess is the lack of understanding of how I have been undaunted during six months of ceaseless activities to put files on my laptop, access files, intercept the Wi-Fi signal, etc., and where I go and what I do when not trackable via known devices/vehicles. Some type of virus is still on my laptop that Kaspersky software hasn't removed that adds gigabyte-size files at startup but doesn't function now because I disabled certain Windows system settings. Weeks ago, however, something occurred with my laptop where it now takes almost five minutes to shut down.

With the Coast Guard looking plane flying over the library yesterday four times, I can only assume spyware was injected into the library's devices to further track all activities in case I use the corded public library computers to access the Internet. And what can I do? I have to keep finding other avenues if I don't want my privacy violated. I guess attorney-client privilege via email is lost. And what can I do when all common avenues are gone and I'm forced to access the Internet and communicate to others like some kind of criminal or plotting terrorist using evasive methods just because I don't want my privacy deliberately, directly violated?

You are reading a letter from a Christian white male born in Texas in 1970, enlisted into the U. S. Air Force and U. S. Army at different times in life. You are reading a letter composed by an American citizen who has been monitored as though I'm a national security threat.

My comments to the FCC pinpointed potential Liberty-related interests and connections. My comments brought up John Malone's obscure TruePosition, the subsidiary of the company with the largest stake in Charter. My comments detailed the catalyst of two individuals, John Malone and Greg Maffei, behind the Applications. My comments also exposed deceptive actions by elected officials, non-profits, chambers of commerce and others in the comments process.

Although I have not yet aggressively pursued class action against Charter regarding Internet pricing practices for customers like myself active prior to October 2014, I remain a viable candidate for lead plaintiff. That too was detailed in my comments.

Don't you think that if what I have been presenting about being under constant surveillance is true, that there is likely a secret agenda for a new Charter that goes beyond expanding broadband service? Why has a military jet flown low over my residence on at least two different days, the first in broad daylight circling where my residence was centered in that circling and the second last week at night as I stood outside watching?

I don't need to write more about this. If this hasn't been enough to recognize there's a bigger picture involved, what would it take?
