Tearful Carson bids good night

DURBAN, Calif. — Johnny Carson ended his 30-year reign on late-night TV on Friday, choking back tears as he closed his final "Tonight Show" by telling America, "I bid you a very heartfelt good night."
Longtime sidekick Ed McMahon yelled the traditional "Here's Johnny" at the start of the show and Doc Severinsen struck up the NBC Orchestra. But little else was the same during Carson's farewell broadcast, with no big-name guests and an invitation-only audience of family and staff at NBC's 500-seat Studio One.

After his last show, Carson was to head for Europe and his annual trip to the Wimbledon tennis match. Jay Leno takes over the show next week.



Retrial of officer in assault on King mandated for L.A.

LOS ANGELES — Superior Court Judge Stanley M. Weisberg Friday ordered that Los Angeles police officer Laurence M. Powell be retried here rather than in suburban Ventura County on charges of feloniously assaulting black motorist Rodney D. King.

The ruling was a victory for the prosecution, which has maintained throughout the King case that an impartial jury could be impaneled from among the nearly 9 million people in Los Angeles County.

Powell is one of four white Los Angeles officers who were charged with beating King after a high-speed chase March 3, 1991. Although a videotape showed King being struck 56 times by Powell and another officer, a Ven-

tura County jury on which there were no blacks acquitted three officers and found Powell not guilty of assault with a deadly weapon and of filing a false police report.

He is to be retried for assault under color of authority, on which a mistrial was declared when the jury deadlocked, 8 to 4, for acquittal.

The verdicts, handed down April 23, loughed off riots here in which at least 52 people died. Defense attorney Michael Stone called Weisberg's ruling "politically correct" but unfair to his client and said he "probably" would appeal. Stone said it would be virtually impossible for Powell to receive a fair trial in Los Angeles County after the riots. He said jurors, fearing renewed violence,

would feel compelled to return a guilty verdict.

But Weisberg said choosing an impartial jury would be much the same anywhere in the state. "No one in California is unaware of the verdict in the first trial and of the events that followed the verdict," he said.

USDA effort poses threat to wetlands

WASHINGTON — The Agriculture Department wants to let farmers drain millions of acres of wetlands, from the Mississippi Delta to the prairie potholes of the Great Plains where migrating waterfowl rest and feed.

The department's draft proposal, obtained by The Associated Press, would exempt farmers from a 1990 law barring federal subsidies to producers who drain or otherwise alter wetlands in "bad faith."

"This is tantamount to USDA's authorization of the use of taxpayer subsidies to agriculture for the destruction of important wetlands resources," said Clark Williams, wetlands specialist for the National Audubon Society.

Galen Bridge, associate chief of the Agriculture Department's Soil Conservation Service, said the draft is merely one of many working papers under consideration

and that environmentalists "are poking sticks at a non-policy."

The proposal, which still must be approved by Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan, would be in line with other efforts by the Bush administration to ease what the president has described as an undue regulatory burden on business.

For more than a year the administration has been trying to rewrite federal regulations that protect wetlands, now narrowly defining what a wetland really is.

Last year the administration floated a draft wetlands proposal, but it was met with such strong opposition — including from the government's own wetlands experts — that it has been in limbo for months.

During the 1988 presidential campaign, Rep. Dan Rostenkowski declared that "all existing wetland papers under consideration should be preserved."



16 nabbed in city drug roundup

City, county and state narcotics agents, responding to numerous citizen complaints, arrested 16 suspects Friday in a roundup of heroin, cocaine, heroin and marijuana dealers in Reading. Some of them in custody were involved in what Lt. Francis P. Drexler, city vice squad commander, described as an active drug market in the 100 block of Orange Street and in the 100 block of Franklin Street. 'They were selling right out on the street, right out in the open,' Drexler said.

These arrests, along with the victory of the city and West Green streets, city vice squad commander Drexler said, are primarily centered, according to his informant. The 16 suspects, five of whom are juveniles, were caught in the raid. Four adults already were in Berks County Jail on unrelated charges, and one of the youths was in the Berks Youth Detention Center, near Wernersville. As of Friday night, 15 suspects remained at large. Drexler described the roundup as a small and sidereal street-level operation. One of the other arrests occurred shortly after 11 a.m. as a team of police initially formed out of City Hall at the beginning of the roundup. Investigators said Jeffrey Lee, 23, of the 200 block of North 11th Street, was arrested shortly after he was seen in a traffic violation fine in Reading District Court. Lee, who is charged with possessing, intending to deliver and delivering cocaine, and the other adults in custody were arraigned on various drug counts.

Ten of those 26 boys were made from three juveniles, he said. 'They (the youths) were so active,' the lieutenant said. 'We were trying to get new people, but they just kept running up to our cars selling.' The other 41 purchases during the investigation were made in the Gordon and West Green streets area by agents from District Attorney Mark C. Balducci's Narcotics Enforcement Team. Drexler said the purchases were for between \$15 and \$100 and amounted to about \$4,000. According to the lieutenant, the investigation was conducted simultaneously with those involving a Mexico-Reading marijuana-trafficking pipeline and prostitution activity in the Seventh and Franklin streets area. Roundups of suspects sought in those probes were held April 29 and May 15, respectively, and charges were filed against 53 people. Because the drug sales were being done so openly in the Orange and Franklin streets areas, every time we had a 15- or 30-minute lull in one of the other investigations, we had guys running down there to make buys,' Drexler said.

Embattled Thai leader reportedly ready to resign

BANGKOK, Thailand — Prime Minister Suchinda Kraprayoon has agreed to resign after being abandoned by the coalition of parties that put him in power, according to a newspaper report early today. Suchinda agreed to step down after a meeting Friday night with King Bhumibol Adulyadej, The Nation newspaper reported. It said the only question remaining was when. Political sources said Suchinda would submit his resignation to Parliament on Monday. Suchinda's attempt to crush pro-democracy protests with brutal force this week had drawn increasing criticism. Despite two days of relative peace since street fighting ended late Wednesday, the capital remained jittery as unconfirmed rumors swirled that the army was planning a coup that Suchinda was quitting. Many government officials stepped

forward to condemn Suchinda's use of troops to fire on protesters, and hundreds of government employees were black in mourning for the dead. Nearly 450 employees in the Finance Ministry and the Customs Department signed petitions demanding Suchinda resign.

Proposed budget cuts fuel student walkout

By J. Earl Ruthardt

Upset about proposed budget cuts, about 80 students Friday morning walked out of Reading High School for a 15-minute protest and then returned to the building.

The school board Wednesday approved a tentative \$9.7 million budget that would eliminate the jobs of two vice principals at the high school, 14 guidance counselors and all elementary art, music and physical education teachers. Classroom teachers would be expected to teach those subjects.

"They're worried more about money than the future education for students," said Jean Scheff, a ninth-grader who took part in the peaceful demonstration. "I object to them eliminating languages, art and guidance counselors."

Jose Peres, a ninth-grader enrolled in some advanced classes, said he doesn't want to see the elimination of those classes, which include science, languages and mathematics.

"It stinks," said Margaret Gift, an 11th-grader who fears the home economics class she is in will be dropped. "I'm taking home-ec

because I want to be a day-care teacher."

Christine Barlet, also in the 11th grade, said eliminating the jobs of physical education teachers could jeopardize college-sports scholarships.

Talking with students outside were Dr. M. Melissa Jamula, assistant to the superintendent for instructional services, and Doug Gasa, G. Kauffman, director of administrative services. They told students a school board meeting is the proper place for students and their parents to voice concerns.

"The students are very concerned about cuts in art, music and physical education at the elementary level," Jamula said later. "Specialists teach art, music and physical education, and classroom teachers are not qualified to teach specialties."

She said the students believe they should be properly educated in the specialties in elementary school. If not, participation in future activities — such as high school band or chorus — could be threatened.

"The frustration level of students is high," Jamula added. "Those who demonstrated are truly concerned. They were not outside to party."

Joining the students were the Rev. Frank D. McCracken, executive director of the Police Athletic League of Greater Reading and pastor of St. James Chapel Church of God in Christ, Fifth and Cherry streets, and Darrell Key, director of Northwest Neighborhood Ministries.

McCracken and Key are part of the school role-model group. When the students returned to the building, they spent about two hours in an instruction room talking with Jamula, McCracken and Key.

These Reading High students are concerned about some curriculum being taken away, and when you take something away from people, there's a response, but not always a positive response," McCracken said. "The students are frustrated."

"We have a nation that is, at best, fragmented with unrest for many reasons. And Reading is not immune to that."

McCracken suggested that students, parents and community leaders, including himself, sit down to resolve educational issues.

"Education can't be in a vacuum, which has been the case in Reading," he said. "It's been left to a single group."

AUTHORITIES PROBE FALSE ALARMS AT HIGH SCHOOL

Richard L. Boyer, first deputy fire chief, said police and five Berks Police Officers A. Lorch are investigating two false alarms turned in Friday at Reading High School after a brief student demonstration outside the school against proposed budget cuts.

Limited partners in defunct bank OK'd to join case

The limited partners and a depositor in the defunct Tobias Knoblauch Private Bank have been allowed to intervene in the case against state Banking Secretary Sarah W. Hargrove, who seized the private bank April 17.

Berks County President Judge Forrest G. Schaeffer Jr. in a brief order issued Friday, allowed two groups of limited partners — who claim to have all the equity in the bank — and depositor Jeffrey W. Rose to join a petition brought by the private bank's four general partners.

The main event — a hearing to determine whether Hargrove abused her discretionary powers in seizing the bank, as the partners have claimed — is slated for next Friday.

Hargrove claimed the private bank was being run in an unsafe and unsound manner and was on the verge of failure when she seized it.

Since then, its best assets and insurable deposits have been transferred to Knoblauch State Bank, which has been operating ever since.

The state bank is owned by the State Workmen's Insurance Fund, which plans to sell it within two years. However, until Schaeffer rules, he has forbidden further transfers or sales.

The partners and Rose claim Hargrove broke numerous state laws in her handling of the seizure and have asked Schaeffer to rescind his April 17 orders, confirming Hargrove as the bank's receiver, and allowing the transfer of the assets.

Hargrove and her lawyers say she acted legally and that the move strengthened the bank and protected its customers. Although numerous issues have arisen since the seizure, Michael R. Bucci Jr., representing Hargrove, at a brief hearing Friday, urged Schaeffer to focus on one issue, whether Hargrove abused her powers as banking secretary.

"What was done on April 17 — protecting the customers — will be for naught if we don't get to that issue," he said. "It is essential that we decide whether the secretary will be unhandcuffed and allowed to proceed."



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

House aide: cash taken, not stamps

WASHINGTON — A House post office supervisor has told federal investigators that he helped members of Congress get thousands of dollars in cash through phony transactions disguised as stamp purchases, according to a source involved in the case.

The supervisor, James C. Smith, was a patronage employee sponsored by Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill.

It was Smith's allegations that prompted prosecutors to subpoena records of stamp purchases and other documents from Ways and Means Chairman Rostenkowski and two other members, Pennsylvania Democrats Joe Kottler and Austin J. Murphy.

Public records show that during the period under scrutiny, all three made relatively large purchases of stamps.

Smith is cooperating with federal officials investigating widespread allegations of wrongdoing at the House post office.

The probe has already found that post office employees embezzled tens of thousands of dollars and dealt drugs. It was Smith's statements to prosecutors that widened the scope of the inquiry.

"Certain members were getting cash, up to \$2,500 at a clip, and it was being disguised that

they were getting postage," the source said of Smith's version of events. "Stamps never went out."

All three members have strongly denied wrongdoing.

"That's ridiculous," Rostenkowski said, when asked if he ever got cash from the post office.

A spokesman for Kottler responded, "He certainly doesn't know if staff did, but he said he did not do that."

Murphy, who denied wrongdoing in a statement issued after the House disclosed the subpoenas May 14, declined through an aide to comment further.

According to another source, the House's former sergeant at arms, Jack Russ, told a federal grand jury May 19 that he had heard that members converted campaign funds by cashing campaign checks at the post office under the guise of buying stamps.

Russ testified that he had no direct knowledge of such activities.

A House task force investigating allegations of wrongdoing at the post office has uncovered allegations similar to those attributed to Smith.

Suspect surrenders in cabbie shooting

John Cunningham — one of two men sought in the May 13 shooting and robbery of Berks Taxi Service driver Bobby Copeland — surrendered to authorities in City Hall about 8:30 p.m. Saturday, police reported.

Cunningham, 26, of the 500 block of Gordon Street, was awaiting arraignment in Reading District Court before District Justice Anthony F. Horning on robbery, aggravated assault, conspiracy and related charges.

The other suspect, Charles Boomer, 22, of the 100 block of North Ninth Street, remains at large.

Investigators said they are questioning Cunningham in connection with possible involvement in other crimes. Although police did not specify which cases, sources said they may include the May 2 gunshot slaying of city resident Baltasar Torres-Cervantes near the victim's residence at 151 Elm St.

Copeland, 58, of the 300 block of North Second Street, suffered a neck wound in the shooting near Sixth and Richmond streets and

remained in stable condition Saturday night in Community General Hospital.

Police said they have not determined if Cunningham or Boomer fired the shot that wounded Copeland, who also was robbed of \$70.

According to investigators, warrants were issued for the two suspects Wednesday after information was obtained from witnesses who saw Boomer and Cunningham enter Copeland's taxi at Third and Elm streets minutes before the shooting.

In the Torres-Cervantes slaying, police said the victim had just left McKnight's Cafe in the 100 block of Elm Street and was carrying a 12-pack of beer when he was approached by three or four black men.

They told him to give them the beer, and he refused. At that point, one of the men pulled out a handgun and shot Torres-Cervantes.

Earlier this week, sources said ballistics tests revealed a 22-caliber handgun, recovered May 15 in the frat block of North Fifth Street, was used in the Torres-Cervantes slaying.
