



SUMMARY: *Out & About* is designed to help children develop a sense of efficacy by teaching them specific social skills and problem-solving processes. The first five programs portray kindergarten children involved in social situations of intense concern to young children. They deal with making and keeping friends, solving a problem, thinking ahead and discovering why something happened as it did. The last three programs present the basic elements of observation. This process of learning by observation is basic to all disciplines.

SUMMARY: These six programs produced in collaboration with NBC News and Questar, provide a historical overview of the defining events of presidential terms throughout from George Washington through Ronald Reagan.



Title: *Foundations of the Republic*

Program Description: George Washington, John Adams, and Thomas Jefferson are portrayed. Significant events recounted include: the struggle for independence, creation of the Constitution, emergence of the Federalists and Republicans, Whiskey Rebellion, the XYZ Affair, the undeclared naval war with France, the Alien and Sedition Acts, the Louisiana Purchase, Marbury vs. Madison, the Embargo, and the emerging crisis over the spread of slavery.

Title: *Spirit of Democracy*

Program Description: Traces the tumultuous decades from Madison to Van Buren. SUMMARY: In *Pyramid*, David Macaulay takes on a voyage of discovery to see and feel the mystery, romance and overwhelming splendor of ancient Egypt and the pyramids during the Fourth Dynasty of the Old Kingdom (circa 2500 B.C.). Incorporating animated story-telling with live-action documentary sequences, the series chronicles the building of the pyramid of King Khufu, called Cheops by the Greeks. In the animated segments, which tell a story, characters are created and then placed in hypothetical but representative situations of the period. In the live-action segments, viewers are taken on a remarkable journey through the archeological remains of Egypt from several important pyramid sites to the Valley of the Kings, including rare footage from the Egyptian Museum in Cairo.
