**ENFORCEMENT BUREAU'S REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL INFORMATION
CONCERNING FAMILY BROADCASTING, INC.'S
TRANSFER OF CONTROL APPLICATIONS**

1. By *Memorandum Opinion and Order and Hearing Designation Order*, FCC 02-91, released March 28, 2002 (“*HDO*”), the Commission consolidated for hearing with the captioned revocation proceeding applications to transfer of control of Family Broadcasting, Inc. (“Family”) (File Nos. BTC-20010315AAJ and BTCH-20010315AAK). In so doing, the Commission noted that the then Mass Media Bureau (now Media Bureau) had not yet processed the applications. The Commission therefore suggested that Media Bureau “avail itself of the opportunity to have the Enforcement Bureau formally request that the ALJ add any further issues deemed appropriate by its processing staff.” *HDO* at ¶ 34.

2. Media Bureau processing personnel have informed Enforcement Bureau counsel that, after reviewing Family’s applications, they would have requested two amendments. The first request would be to have Family amend its applications by reducing to writing the oral agreement which proposes to give the shares owned by Gerard A. Luz James and Asta James, his wife, which represent 83 percent of Family’s voting shares, to their four adult children. The second request would be to have Family amend its applications by

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identifying the holders of the remaining 17 percent of Family's voting shares. Currently, the applications do not reveal the identities of those persons or entities.

3. Accordingly, the Bureau does not propose the addition of any new issues at this time. However, the Bureau does request that Family be ordered to submit within 30 days of the issuance of an appropriate order the amendments specified above.




