In the Matter of Revision of the Commission’s Rules To Ensure Compatibility with Enhanced 911 Emergency Calling Systems; Phase II Compliance Deadlines for Non-Nationwide Carriers

Dear Ms. Dortch:

Pacific Wireless Technologies, Inc. (“Pacific”), by its attorneys, hereby respectfully notifies the Federal Communications Commission (the “Commission”) that as a result of the approved sale of the FCC-licensed assets of Pacific to a subsidiary of Nextel Communications Inc. (“Nextel”), Pacific is no longer subject to the provisions of section 20.18(e) of the Commission’s rules (the “Rule”), nor the Order to Stay released on July 26, 2002 in the above-captioned proceeding.^{1/}

On August 8, 2001, Pacific submitted a request for a temporary waiver of the Rule (the “Request”) and submitted a supplement to its Request on November 30, 2001 (the “Supplement”). In both the Request and the Supplement, Pacific notified the Commission of a pending assignment of most of Pacific’s licensed-assets to a subsidiary of Nextel.^{2/} Pacific indicated that upon the completion of the transaction, Pacific would no longer offer wireless communications that implicate the Rule. The Commission



consented to the assignment on November 16, 2001^{3/} and Pacific and Nextel consummated the transaction on December 21, 2001.

On July 26, 2002, the Commission released an Order to Stay the application of certain specific E911 Phase II deadlines to non-nationwide Commercial Mobile Radio Service ("CMRS") providers, including Pacific, which filed requests for waivers relating to those deadlines. The Order to Stay requires Pacific to comply with the revised Phase II implementation deadlines and to file an Interim Report by August 1, 2003.^{4/} This letter serves as notification that as a result of assigning its FCC licensed-assets to Nextel, Pacific no longer has an independent obligation to comply with the requirements of the Order to Stay, including the reporting requirements for Tier III carriers, or any other obligations under the Rule.
