

Publisher to merge Eastside, South County suburban papers

New King County Journal will focus on south, east

Facing increasing competition from two metropolitan newspapers, Horvitz Newspapers Inc. -- publisher of the Eastside Journal and the South County Journal -- will merge the two suburban dailies under the King County Journal masthead later this year.

The change, expected to occur Dec. 30, will give the paper a combined circulation of 49,000 -- making it the seventh-largest newspaper in the state. It will be the second name change for the suburban papers in the past six years.

A few employees could lose their jobs as a result of the merger, said Peter Horvitz, president and CEO. The two papers employ about 300 people.

Horvitz bought the Eastside Journal and the South County Journal in 1994, when they were named the Journal American and Valley Daily News. He said the most recent strategy shift was necessary to compete against The Seattle Times and the Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

Pointing especially to aggressive efforts by the Times, he said, the metropolitan dailies have targeted suburbs such as Bellevue, Redmond and Renton for expansion. Those are the primary markets for the King County Journal Newspapers.

"There is no question that this is a very competitive media landscape, and my job is to position my newspaper so we can be successful," Horvitz said.

He declined to comment on whether the Eastside Journal and the South County Journal are profitable, although he did say the papers have not met his expectations with respect to financial performance.

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"The fact is that we are in a tough industry in a competitive market and therefore we have to improve our financial performance," he said. "We are taking very aggressive and intelligent steps to do that."

The combined newspaper will be produced at a new \$21 million printing press in Kent, next to the current South County Journal facility. Horvitz said the new facility will increase efficiency.

News of countywide interest will be emphasized in the combined paper along with community-specific news. As part of the move, the King County Journal will continue to operate facilities in Bellevue and Kent. The paper will be zoned, meaning separate editions will be produced for readers who live in South King County and on the Eastside.

The price of the paper will remain 25 cents daily, and the overall design will not be altered significantly, Horvitz said. The color of the masthead has not been chosen; the Eastside Journal's is blue while South County's is green.

Doug Margeson, a reporter with 20 years at the Eastside Journal, said he is hopeful the strategy will pay off. Circulation has fallen at the two papers.

"We would love to see the newspaper become bigger, better, more successful," said Margeson, a representative of one of the bargaining units at the Eastside Journal. "I don't know if it will work or not, but I certainly hope it will."

Historically, South King County -- with blue-collar cities such as Kent and Auburn -- and the Eastside -- dominated by technology havens such as Redmond and Kirkland -- have been viewed as two very different markets.

Combining the two could be a challenge. But Horvitz said with proper zoning and a focus on stories with a "countywide appeal," the hurdles can be overcome.

"Our papers have been evolving," Horvitz said. "And this is the natural evolution."


