



I am 41 years old, and this is only the second time in my life that I have written someone like you about an issue. Obviously, I feel strongly about this.




Dear Mr. Adelstein,

At the turn of the 20th Century, President Theodore Roosevelt mounted a massive campaign in Congress to break up the monopolies.


If you vote to allow relax the broadcast ownership rules, you will be allowing a new media monopoly.



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

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

Many people in our community are alarmed about impending changes by the F.C.C. to increase the allowable amount of radio and T.V. ownership in particular hands in local areas, beyond the present limit.

At the present allowable amount of 35%, the situation is threatening enough. The opinion and news preferred by the owners dominate the air, reflecting the economic, social and political views of their outlook. The air is owned by the people. That is the federal statute. Ownership of the means of access to the people must be kept open to reflect their diversity of views.

We regret that you are not arranging public meetings with listeners through the country to hear their thoughts on the matter. Such meetings have been held before for critical questions such as this.

We urge that you reconsider your position of enhancing greater control of the air by the few, and at least keep to the present limits.
