A. Number of BOC local service access lines by month and state for 2003.

See Attachment A. Between January and December 2003, the total number of SBC's switched access lines (without counting SNET) declined from 45,345,453 to 42,248,934, following an earlier decline from 53,361,029 to 45,345,453 (approximately 15%) between December 1999 and January 2003.

B. Number of BOC 272 affiliate interLATA minutes of use by month and state for 2003.

See Attachment B – Redacted. The increased usage is because seven of SBC's thirteen in-region states (including CA) launched long distance service in 2003, and SBC introduced a number of competitive pricing plans around April 2003.
