The DC Circuit Court would eliminate choice for millions of consumers around the country; nearly two million of them in California alone. This decision would send us back to a time when the only way to get local phone service was from one of two giant monopolies. Depending on where you lived, you were either beholden to Verizon Communications (formerly GTE) or SBC Communications (formerly Pacific Bell). There were no other options. No other choices.

Competition has brought much needed diversity to the market. Companies must compete to serve Latino customers by offering lower prices and top-notch customer service. A modest example: our company specializes in providing local and long-distance telephone service, as well as dial-up Internet access to Spanish-speaking households.
