### Mayor's Agenda: Tough job of budget preparation

**For the past several weeks the city council and staff have been busily working on the city budget for the next fiscal year, Oct. 1, 2000-Sept. 30, 2001.**

The budget is the most important piece of legislation that the council has to consider. It is actually a plan for what is to be done and how it is to be funded. All monies to be collected and all monies to be spent must be included in the budget to be lawful.

Before the council can actually adopt the proposed budget, certain legal steps must be followed. For example, a notice must be published in the newspaper announcing the date a public hearing will be held to allow citizens an opportunity to have input.


After the public hearing, and before final adoption, changes deemed necessary by the council can still be made. Final approval consists of adopting an ordinance approving the budget, then adopting another ordinance setting the tax rate that property owners will be required to pay for the next year.

Once this is done, the budget can only be changed by order of the council, in the event of an emergency or other reasons outlined by law.

Preparing the budget gets tougher every year, growth being one of the main reasons.

We have been fortunate so far in that we have had limited growth over which we have maintained some control. Nevertheless, growth affects every aspect of city government. For example, by the end July we had issued 99 new residential building permits. This compares to only 73 for the same time last year.

Somebody has to do the administrative work in issuing the added

Somebody has to do the administrative work in issuing the added permits. Somebody has to do the inspections. Somebody has to hook up the water and sewer and somebody else has to tie the driveway into the street.

Every new residence requires police, fire and sanitation services and every new resident, at one time or another, has business with city hall that must be handled.

In addition to growth, there is always the actual inflationary increases that must be dealt with. For example, the price of gasoline. The city uses a lot of gasoline so this has had a significant effect on our budget. We have to buy pickups, trucks, police cars and machinery.

One of any city's major expenses is personnel and ours is no exception. You cannot provide good service without good employees. To attract and retain good employees we must offer reasonable pay and benefits, and we are doing that in this budget.

The proposed budget addresses all of these issues and, I believe, will do a good job for the city during the next year.

We are also expanding our infrastructure to accommodate growth. This includes expanding the water and wastewater systems to accommodate new homes as they are being built. Obviously you cannot wait until the homes are finished to build the infrastructure to serve them. We have approximately \$10 million in capital improvement projects under way or in the planning stages to accommodate this need.

These improvements are being financed with bond proceeds which will be repaid with revenues generated from a larger tax base and from increased systems revenue. These will be spread out over a number of years to minimize the impact and to spread out the cost to the builders and users.

Included in the proposed budget is a combined tax rate of .7677 cents per \$100 property valuation including both the operation and maintenance tax rate and the debt service tax rate. This is actually a lower tax rate than last year and will help offset the increase in values that a lot of folks experienced on their property this year.

The new budget also includes adding three employees - one at city hall, one in public works and one new police officer. All employees will get pay increases with special attention to those at the low end of the pay scale.

We are also increasing the money allocated for street overlays and other related work. Our total budget for street improvements for next year alone is over \$300,000. This year we spent approximately that much but this included catching up from last year when we had problems with our contractor.

The proposed budget is available at city hall for your review, and I urge you to do this. If you have any questions, please talk to one of the city council or the staff. I also urge you to attend the budget public hearing and let your opinions be heard.

Your council and city staff are working hard for you. Let them know that you appreciate it.

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### Growth demands, oil costs hike budget

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**A proposal to increase revenues from property taxes by 6.52 percent drew only a smattering of vocal opposition at a public hearing Sept. 21 as the Lago Vista City Council unveiled its municipal budget for 2000-01.**

The budget received unanimous approval by the council. Final budget approval and the setting of the tax rate are scheduled at 9 a.m. Friday, Sept. 29 at city hall.

At \$15 million-plus, the budget was heavily impacted by growth service demands and the big jump in oil prices, noted Mayor Dennis Jones. To offset these changes, the city proposes increases in water and sewer rates, garbage and other fees and particularly charges to builders.

Of the budget total, \$8.435 million is for a utility bond issue.

Under the property tax revenue proposal, "taxes on the average homestead would increase by \$55.25 or 7.29 percent" compared to last year, according to the city. But City Manager Kelvin Knauf stated that, per state law requirements, "comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would decrease by .0213 cents per \$100 of taxable value or 2.7 percent compared to last year.

The new budget, the mayor said, reduces the tax rate from .789 cents per \$100 valuation to .7677 cents per valuation.

Few residents testified against the tax increase. Among them were local residents Laura Warren, an attorney with the state, and Pam and David Hanley, of Professional Liability Insurance Services Inc.

Warner said she thought taxes were "too high for poor working people. "You're going to make it so expensive that you're going to run us out of town," she said.

town," she said.

Ms. Hanley, noting that high taxes were having an adverse impact on her local business, cited nearby communities, including Jonestown, with lower tax rates.

"Why is it \$3,000 more to live out here than in Westlake?"

"The combined tax rate is killing us," she said. "School taxes, city taxes - the combined rate really stings."

Alderman Fred Harless responded that "this council has worked intensely to keep the cost of growth from affecting people who live here."

Harless said tax comparisons with area communities ignored differences in stages of growth. "Jonestown doesn't even have sewer service," he said.

"The city can't hedge on oil and fuel costs and felt the impact of oil price increases in this budget," he said. "We'll spend \$300,000 on asphalt, more than \$40,000 more than last year."

The alderman also noted that while the city could increase fees for builders, it faced costly growth challenges such as development of sewage treatment facilities necessitated by the requirement that municipalities stop discharging effluent in Lake Travis by 2004.

"We haven't discouraged anyone yet," Harless said, of the prospect that mounting taxes and fees might turn back the tide of growth.

The mayor said Lago Vista faces the difficult problems of a new city - providing basic services required to keep pace with growth.

"There are no overnight solutions," he said.

Other highlights of the new budget:

It includes \$8,000 for ordinance codification, \$40,000 for completion of the Master Plan, an average six percent pay raise for police officers and an average four percent for other city employees.

In new personnel, the budget adds a police officer, a clerical position at city hall and a maintenance person for the water and sewer departments. The budget increases street maintenance by \$123,577 (including a new crackseal program), garbage fees from \$10.95 to \$12 per month, water and sewer rates by five percent, the building permit fee by \$25. Other city fees also are increased.

The city's 300-ft. extension policy for water and sewer service would be reduced to 150 feet with actual cost charges for extensions over that distance under the new budget.

Also increased in the budget is the city's contribution to the library from \$12,000 to \$19,000.

The council began budget deliberations in August, looking at a figure of \$16,877,933 with no increase in fees in any revenue project.

The revised budget does not include funding for the sports complex due to not receiving grant funds.

Also dropped from the budget were a SCADA system for utilities at \$90,000, some staff requests for equipment replacement, a GIS mapping system and funding for a home rule election following the release of new census figures.
