

Dear Ms. Dortch:

Because our county and the northeastern region of North Carolina is rural by nature, many citizens in our area rely on satellite to receive television programming. Unfortunately, citizens in several of our neighboring counties cannot now receive North Carolina's public television network, UNC-TV, by satellite.

We understand that an administrative change by the FCC in the city of license of our regional UNC-TV network station, WUND, will assure that thousands of citizens in our neighboring northeast counties will have access to UNC-TV network programming. This programming, much of which consists of news, public affairs, cultural and educational programming about North Carolina, is of great interest and importance to our northeast region and the citizens of the region.

Since the UNC-TV network is paid for and supported by taxpayers throughout our state, it is unfair that all of the citizens in the northeast region of the state cannot now receive their state public TV network by satellite. We urge the FCC to change that by redesignating WUND's city of license to Edenton.

The County Commissioners of Tyrrell County in which Columbia is located do not view this proposed change in the city of license of WUND an abandonment in any way of service to the citizens of Columbia or Tyrrell County. WUND serves the region and should be available by satellite to all citizens in their region.

We think the change will further our regional efforts at economic development and make our region an even more attractive area in which to work and live.



First of all I would like to express to you our sincere appreciation for the presentation that you and Carl Davis made to the Tyrrell County Board of Commissioners on September 21, 2004. Since 1965 WUND-TV has been a good neighbor and has served the public interest very well in Tyrrell County and throughout Northeastern North Carolina.

After hearing your presentation yesterday afternoon the Tyrrell County Board of Commissioners endorsed the change of the community license for WUND-TV from Columbia to Edenton, with the understanding that services to the Columbia area will not change and that the tower will remain where it is currently located. The Board recognizes the importance of this change from Columbia to Edenton to all the citizens in the nine other Northeastern North Carolina counties who currently are unable to receive UNC-TV via satellite and receive only signals from Virginia.

I am writing related to the Petition filed by UNC-TV, the public television network serving North Carolina, to change WUND-TV/DT's community of license from Columbia, North Carolina, to Edenton, North Carolina.

As the county manager of Currituck County, I support this Petition, and I urge the Federal Communications Commission to grant UNC-TV's request. I believe it is important that the FCC understand that Columbia will not suffer as a result of this change; viewers of WUND will continue to receive WUND over the air and via cable, and UNC-TV's programming will continue to be available to satellite subscribers. If this change is not approved, then thousands of satellite subscribers in eight northeast North Carolina counties—Hertford, Gates, Chowan, Perquimans, Pasquotank, Camden, Currituck, and Dare—will not have access to all those programs UNC-TV produces just for North Carolinians.

UNC-TV not only broadcasts excellent public television programs from PBS, but also, and more importantly, it produces and broadcasts hundreds of hours of programs intended for North Carolinians and those in surrounding states interested in our state's activities and issues. These programs include a nightly information program, **North Carolina Now**; a weekly program on activities at the North Carolina General Assembly, **Legislative Week in Review**; a weekly program on activities, events, and places to go in North Carolina titled **North Carolina Weekend**; a weekly interview program with prominent North Carolina citizens titled **North Carolina People**; and an extensive, ongoing schedule of documentaries and specials on North Carolina cultural activities and events.

Even with a change in the city of license for WUND, viewers served by this station will continue to be served. And, if the city of license is not changed, thousands of North Carolina citizens in the northeastern part of our state who receive their television service via satellite will remain unable to receive UNC-TV via the local-to-local service made available by their satellite provider. Instead, they will continue to receive their public television from a Virginia station while paying, through tax dollars and personal support, for the important and unique programming and services of UNC-TV. It seems to me to be unacceptable that these viewers who desire information and programs about North Carolina cannot receive them via satellite. If the FCC grants the UNC-TV request to change the city of license for WUND-TV/DT from Columbia to Edenton, then the people in these counties will be able to receive the service of UNC-TV via satellite.




