As a mother of young children, I am very concerned about the level of violence on TV today. In fact, to combat its obviously negative effects on our children (e.g., bad dreams, acting out, fears, etc.), our family basically can't watch TV anymore. Even during early-evening family shows, the commercials for later-showing NOT family shows go over the line in violence, sexual innuendo (or more), and snotty attitudes that are not acceptable for any person to display toward other human beings.
