As an organization dedicated to enhancing the educational opportunities of Latino students, we have identified this merger as an important step in the process of increasing the connectivity of Hispanic communities worldwide. Through new technologies such as telephony and voice-over-internet, the SBC-AT&T Merger promises to strengthen the ties that connect our communities to their native countries.

More importantly, we can now expect greater access to educational resources for people living in distant communities, where once we could only imagine it. Over the last ten years, institutions of higher learning in the United States and abroad have embraced the concept of distance learning, where students attend classes through online portals. What may have then started as a trend in educational approaches has become a mainstay of higher education limited only by the technological barriers inherent within the industry. We believe that the standardization of communication protocols will help to expand and promote these distance learning programs. So that we may allow ourselves to speak of global classrooms where students living in Central America can enroll and attend American institutions of higher learning through telephony and virtual classrooms.
