On behalf of the undersigned organizations, we are writing to support the renomination of Dr. Brian Talbott to the Universal Service Administrative Company board.


Dr. Talbott has served on the USAC board for a number of years. During his tenure, he has been attentive to and understanding of the needs of private schools regarding the E-rate program, and has been an advocate for many of the issues that are of importance to private schools (such as whether E-rate funds are federal dollars, whether they should be impacted by the Anti-Deficiency Act, and whether the application process can be significantly simplified). 

E-rate in Massachusetts

Critical for Student Improvement

Since 1998, Massachusetts schools and libraries have received commitments for¹ approximately \$249 million in E-rate discounts.

Increasingly, Massachusetts districts are recognizing the value of the E-rate discount program, with 81% of Massachusetts districts using it in 2003-2004, compared to 77% in 2002-2003. With discounts based on economic disadvantage and location (urban or rural), some Massachusetts districts are eligible for discounts as high as 90%. The average discount for Massachusetts districts is 60%.

E-rate has provided much-needed connectivity to Massachusetts schools. Moreover, Internet connectivity has become the indispensable means for schools to carry out many critical tasks, such as receiving test results from the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS), providing online data reporting and data analysis, implementing e-learning/distance learning initiatives, and supporting parent-teacher communications.

Here are examples of how Universal Service Fund has helped to improve student learning in Massachusetts schools:

- With support from E-rate Boston Public Schools are able to have 100% of their instructional computers connected to the Internet and 98-99% of their classrooms connected to the Internet. As a result, teachers, principals, and administrators are able to use the district's MyBPS online system. MyBPS is the Boston Public Schools' intranet portal, which provides teachers, administrators, principals, and staff with access to the essential, everyday information and resources they need to enhance teaching and learning across the district. MyBPS is the vehicle that unifies all Boston Public Schools constituents in the improvement of student achievement by using technology to deliver educational tasks. <https://www.mybps.org/MyBPS/GenericModules/DesktopDefault.aspx>
- Springfield Public Schools, the second largest urban school district in the Commonwealth, has benefited substantially from the support of E-rate. In 2000-2001, 43% of Springfield classrooms were connected to the Internet; in 2001-2002, 58% were connected; in 2002-2003, 61% were connected; and in 2003-2004, 63% of their classrooms were connected to the Internet. As a result, not only are Springfield Public Schools able to use their online system for administration (as stated above); they are also able to implement an online project (*The SPS Online Part II - Enabling the Homebound Student to Achieve*) to support their homebound students. This project has designed and developed curriculum-aligned, online courses for over 100 homebound students. It is giving these students an opportunity to succeed academically in a non-traditional, non-threatening, supportive online environment that would otherwise not be possible. <http://www.doe.mass.edu/edtech/grants/fy05/fe170b.html>
- Plymouth is a rural town in the southeastern part of the state. With the support of E-rate, 100% of its classrooms are now connected to the Internet. Hence Plymouth is able to use the state's distance learning system, "Massachusetts Online Network for Education (MassONE, formerly known as VES, Virtual Education Space)," to allow its teachers and students to take online courses. *Project WEAVES (Writing with Educational Applications in Virtual Education Space)* is one of the online projects that Plymouth has successfully implemented. Writing across the curriculum is the theme for this multidiscipline program. The goal of the project is to provide online professional development to middle and high school teachers to improve all student learning through the development and delivery of online courses focusing on the state's English Language Arts Framework. http://www.doe.mass.edu/edtech/toolkit/students/VHS_atrisk.pdf

The E-rate program is definitely an indispensable program in Massachusetts. E-rate is vital to providing quality education for the students of today and tomorrow.


The Southeast Kansas Education Service Center possesses all of the right and privileges of a school districts, except the power to levy taxes. Schools can participate in any number of more than 200 educational programs ranging from distance education and online-learning to parent education and cooperative purchasing. With no base membership fee or state administrative support, schools districts only pay for only those services that meet local need. Nearly two-thirds of all Kansas schools contract from some service from Greenbush.

The Greenbush E-rate Consortium offers more than 45 Kansas schools assistance in filling out and submitting their e-rate applications. The Greenbush E-rate Consortium assists schools in filling out their Form 470 and Form 471, while providing consultation in their bidding proposals. Greenbush personnel serve as the liaison between the Schools and Libraries Division and the school district during the program review process. Once the district has received their funding commitment letter, the Consortium assists schools in filling out their Form 486 and 472. The Greenbush E-rate Consortium also provides on-line phone support to numerous districts throughout the state during the entire funding year.
