The malice of the process is that the federal regulation was dismantled in the name of competition, and now the proposal is to dismantle the competition too, leaving the people without the regulatory agencies and without the competition either! We the people want both the regulatory agencies to protect our interest and the open possibility of new providers to enter the field. For this latter, no restrictions to the new start-up companies may exist, even in the hidden form of higher fees for cable use. The cable owners and operators ought to be subject both to government regulations (to defend the people's interests) as well as to be required to charge the same to all users, whether these are an affiliate company or a small, medium or large sized start-up company.
