Dear Ms. Dortch:

On April 3, 2006, Bradley Holmes, Chief Operating Officer of NY3G Partnership ("NY3G"), met with Barry Ohlson, legal advisor to Commissioner Adelstein, regarding the above-referenced proceeding. NY3G explained that the Commission's proposed "split-the-football" approach would not provide a viable solution for the co-channel F group licensees in New York City. As a practical business matter, in light of customer expectations of mobility, no wireless broadband provider could realistically offer a mobile service covering less than half of a metro area. Moreover, as shown in the attached maps, a split-the-football approach would create a huge exclusion zone, denying service on the F group channels to more than seven million people (and many millions more working, shopping, and traveling) in the heart of the market, including all of Manhattan, the Bronx, and Staten Island and much of Brooklyn, Queens, Westchester County and Jersey City. To remedy these problems, NY3G urged the Commission to divide the frequencies between the co-channel licensees, which would permit NY3G to offer a competitive, market-wide broadband service and eliminate the exclusion zone.
