HORIZONS

- Apr. 2** **A Love Story from the 1940s**
A true story edited from hundreds of letters written by a couple named James and Janice. Actualities from the couple are woven with music and archival radio clips from the 40s. How are contemporary love, marriage, and courtship different than in the 1940s?
- Apr. 9** **The Vital Link: Computer Access for the Blind**
The lack of sight translates into lack of information, which is the biggest handicapping factor of blindness. On this program, a first hand account of the impact computers have on the lives of blind people.
- Apr. 16** **Native Americans and the Nuclear Waste Battle**
Supporters and opponents of proposed nuclear waste dumps on the Mescalero Apache Reservation in New Mexico and the Western Shoshones Reservation in Nevada discuss the effects of placing waste storage on Indian land.
- Apr. 23** **Housing for Our Graying Society**
Examines an array of housing alternatives available to help the elderly make moving away from home a pleasant experience. Group living arrangements, adapting homes already owned by other seniors, senior co-op housing, and nursing homes are just a few of the choices available today.
- Apr. 30** **Kids & Violence: Breaking the Cycle**
Today one in every ten children belongs to a gang. On this program gang members and other kids describe the tensions & choices they face every day in their schools and on the streets.
- May 7** **Betty Freidan: Feminism and the Future**
Despite popular claims that feminism is dead, 70-year-old Betty Freidan remains at the helm of the women's movement. This program profiles her life and the continuing evolution of the women's movement.
- May 14** **The Hidden Jews of New Mexico: Rekindling the Spirit**
Spanish Jews were among the settlers who came to New Mexico during the 1600s, fleeing the Inquisition. They hid their Jewish identity, outwardly pretending to be Catholic, and secretly practiced Jewish traditions dating back to the Spain of the Middle Ages. This program examines why some of today's descendants are going public and how they handle their dual Catholic and Jewish heritage.
- May 21** **Belize: Healing Practices in the Rain Forest**
Black Latinos, Mayans, and other Native American people near the tropical rain forest of Belize have retained their traditional medicines and healing practices for centuries. On this program, contemporary healers and others discuss ways to maintain physical and spiritual balance through medicine and healing.
- May 28** **Women in Cuba: Balancing Progress and Old Habits**
Cuban women's lives have improved since 1959, because of free health care, equality of pay, and other laws. However, since Cuba faces acute economic problems and food shortages, most housewives stand in long lines just for basic necessities. This program examines why many Cuban women remain optimistic about their lives and are not willing to return to pro-communist attitudes.




