Dear Chairman Martin and Esteemed Commissioners:

For all its troubles, Adelphia provided a complete and comprehensive cable lineup to all sectors of the local community, for all age groups, interests and preferences, including sports-specific programming such as the NFL Network, accessible on basic cable which cable subscribers receive without paying any additional premium as we would for HBO, Showtime, Cinemax and Encore.

As you know, the National Football League is the custodian of America's number one spectator team sport--football, an endeavor which is also played by Americans directly as participants on all levels--in youth centers, elementary, middle and high schools, in colleges (Divisions 1, 2, and 3), community colleges, the NFL proper, NFL Europe, the CFL, semi-pro leagues, and even the burgeoning women's variant. The Super Bowl itself, is indicative of the passionate, integrating love affair that men and women, boys and girls have for this wondrously indigenous melding of athleticism and artistry, gamesmanship and gladiator courage, strategy and sensation.

Football is truly America's pastime and has an honored place in our precious, dwindling leisure time as families and workplaces unite to watch, cheer for our favored home-town or adoptive teams, and even denounce our rivals--all, or mostly, in good fun. Can one even imagine America without football or vice versa? No, I think not.

Like Ebenezer Scrooge, unfortunately Time-Warner has acquired the bankrupt Adelphia and instead of maintaining the NFL Network for the enjoyment of long-time Adelphia subscribers (given no choice whatsoever in whether we wanted Time-Warner whatsoever), immediately stripped it away until the Federal Communications Commission restored our gridiron channel temporarily by an order which expires on or about September 3, 2006 on the cusp of the kickoff of the 2006 NFL season.

We urge you to further extend indefinitely the extant order requiring the Time-Warner multinational conglomerate to maintain our link to America's greatest sport by keeping the NFL Network on our television sets for the duration of the season and playoffs in the 2006-2007 period.

Teplitz, Vice President and Associate General Counsel, Time Warner Inc., participated in a series of meetings and telephone conversations regarding the above captioned proceeding, as follows: On August 3, 2006, Mr. Britt participated in a telephone conversation regarding the proceeding with Chairman Kevin Martin and on August 4, 2006, Mr. Britt participated in separate telephone conversations regarding the proceeding with Commissioner Michael Copps and Commissioner Deborah Taylor Tate. On August 3, 2006, Mr. Teplitz participated in separate telephone conversations regarding the proceeding with Heather Dixon, Legal Advisor, Media Issues for Chairman Kevin Martin, Rudy Brioche', Legal Advisor, Media Issues for Commissioner Jonathon Adelstein, and Sam Feder, General Counsel, and on August 4, 2006, Mr. Teplitz met in person regarding the proceeding with Commissioner Tate and Chris Robbins, Acting Legal Advisor for Commissioner Tate.
