## SUMMARY

Just over three hundred people attended the “Town Meeting on the Future of Media” at the University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee on September 7, 2006. The event featured remarks by FCC Commissioners Michael Copps and Jonathan Adelstein and Lt. Governor Barbara Lawton. Former State Supreme Court Justice Janine Geske moderated the event’s panels, which included comments from local and state leaders concerned about media consolidation. Panelists included:

The Town Hall Meeting also included an extensive period of public testimony. Anyone from the audience who wished to testify was allowed two minutes to address Commissioners Copps and Adelstein about the media ownership rulemaking process underway at the FCC. Participants were informed that their public comments would be placed in the appropriate FCC docket. Testimony continued for nearly four hours – and comments were overwhelmingly opposed to increased media consolidation.
