

Increasing access to wireless broadband technology would serve many ends: it would increase involvement in civic discourse by making news and governmental services more readily available, it would foster an equality of opportunity through the equality of access created and it would undeniably drive the American economy to grow.

At present, I understand there is a proposal with the FCC that, if approved, would make fast, free and family friendly universal wireless Internet access throughout our country a reality.

Please do not let this historic opportunity lapse. Give Americans the right to use technology to make their lives, and our country, better.
