Unlicensed Devices in the "White Spaces" ET Docket No. 04-186

Dear Ms. Dortch:

I am writing on behalf of Samson Technologies, a U.S. distributor of high quality, wireless microphone products. As the Commission undertakes the development of rules to allow unlicensed devices to operate in the "White Spaces," Samson wishes to strongly suggest that the Commission protect the users of wireless microphones operating in the "White Spaces" and to conduct various tests to ensure that operation may continue without interference. The Commission has repeatedly affirmed its commitment to protect all incumbents, including wireless microphones. We believe further testing is essential to meet this goal and, specifically, to protect the use of wireless microphones in areas such as national sporting events, Broadway theatre, etc.

As a leading supplier of wireless microphones, Samson shares the concerns of many in the regard to the Commission's development of rules for unlicensed devices in the "White Spaces", which will have a broad effect on the wireless microphone industry. We urge the Commission to develop adequate protection for wireless microphones, which will allow the current usage to continue in an interference-free environment.

The manufacturers of these new devices operating in these "White-Spaces" should demonstrate through testing, on the record in this proceeding, that their technology is capable of providing sufficient interference-free protection. Wireless microphones perform essential functions, and numerous industries depend on the quality and integrity of their performance.

Please take this into consideration before approving any new devices in these "White-Spaces" approved for unlicensed use.
