For example, some cell phone companies that use compatible technology have installed "software locks" to prevent consumers from using their phones on their competitors' networks. Others simply blacklist phones. That means, if you switch companies you have to get a new phone, whether you want to or not.

These practices are anti-competitive and unfair to consumers. The FCC recognized that for landline phones. Given that there are more than 200 million cell phone customers in the U.S., it's time to give consumers the same marketplace choices in wireless service.

The FCC should apply the "Carterphone" rules to commercial wireless networks.
